A voyage with Paul Gauguin Cruises offers unparalleled opportunities for making once-in-a lifetime memories in this bucket-list South Seas destination.

The line celebrated 25 years of sailing in French Polynesia in 2023 and I was invited to sail on its seven-night Tahiti & the Society Islands voyage aboard the m/s Paul Gauguin. I met a number of repeat guests on my cruise and it's easy to see why The Gauguin has such a loyal following. The ship and the destination will steal your heart.

Here are 11 reasons why a voyage with Paul Gauguin Cruises is the ultimate all-inclusive experience in dreamy French Polynesia. »

1/Award-Winning Small Ship—The Gauguin offers an exceptionally luxurious small ship experience. Designed with a tropically chic flair, this intimate ship accommodates just 330 guests in a setting of relaxed elegance. I loved the camaraderie that developed among the vibrant, active, and extraordinarily friendly community of guests.

As the longest continuously sailing luxury cruise ship in the South Pacific, The Gauguin was purpose-built with a shallow draft to expertly navigate the region's turquoise lagoons and access remote hideaways that larger ships can't reach. It's the ideal way to explore this region.

PRO TIP: Take advantage of the ship's spacious outdoor decks and view the collection of Polynesian artifacts and excellent digital museum with work by French artist Paul Gauguin.

2/Idyllic Island-Rich Itineraries—French Polynesia contains 118 islands and atolls, so you'll want to see more than just one or two of these fairytale destinations while you're there. Unpack once in your floating overwater "bungalow" and explore five or more legendary isles in a single trip. These pristine islands are undeveloped, tropical You'll enjoy unforgettable days and nights on your voyage and the island views from the sea are truly spectacular. There are nine unique

itineraries in 2025, so it's easy to go islandhopping on The Gauguin. No inter-island flight hassles and expenses are required. Longer stays in ports of call are a highlight, including overnights in Bora Bora and Moorea in many cases. 3/Luxurious Overwater Accommodations— After explorations ashore, it's nice to retreat to your elegant stateroom or suite to enjoy some quiet time. The Gauguin's well-appointed accommodations all offer magnificent ocean views and nearly 70 percent feature private balconies. I loved watching Technicolor sunrises and sunsets from my balcony and toasting our day's adventures each evening.

The ship's spacious accommodations have been beautifully fitted with high-quality amenities and special touches, with upper

Bathrooms feature full-sized tubs and in-room refrigerators are stocked daily by attentive room stewards. Wheelchairaccessible staterooms and family-friendly accommodations are also available.

PRO TIP: To maximize charging options for electronics on your trip, bring a multi-port travel adapter and European plug adapters.

4/Extraordinary Service—The heart of The Gauguin is the fabulous staff and crew led by its charismatic French captain.

The ship features a crew-to-guest ratio of 1:1.5, one of the highest at sea. The service on my sailing was unparalleled, as was the incredible spirit. There's an irresistible enthusiasm present and the warmth and smiles are genuine.

It amazed me how much the team went out of its way to provide personalized attention and by the second day, the staff and crew knew everyone's names. Numerous crew members have been with the ship for 10 years or more.

PRO TIP: See the onboard Travel Concierge for help arranging e-bikes, car rentals, and restaurant reservations ashore.



**5/Exceptional All-Inclusive Value**— I often find myself daydreaming about my days in paradise aboard *The Gauguin*. The cruise exceeded my expectations, and it was a sensational value compared to land-based resort packages.

The all-inclusive pricing and incredible value make this experience a relaxing and stress-free escape, and the memories are priceless.

PRO TIP: If you're celebrating an anniversary, honeymoon, or vow renewal, you'll receive an invitation to a complimentary Polynesian blessing ceremony and an in-stateroom bottle of Champagne. Additional celebration packages are available.

**6/Outstanding Fine Dining**—Pack your appetite and plan to enjoy all the memorable culinary experiences on board. The ship's award-winning chefs create a wide selection of gourmet international cuisines and locally sourced Polynesian specialties, all carefully prepared and artfully served. The ship also does an excellent job catering to food allergies and special diets.

Guests can enjoy five-star meals in their choice of three fully included dining venues — La Veranda, Le Grill, and the L'Etoile main restaurant, which offers a rotating daily menu of delectable choices. Wine selections are excellent and unlimited pours are included. Complimentary 24-hour room service is also available, so enjoy the laid-back luxury of breakfast in bed or on your balcony.

PRO TIP: Call or stop by to make specialty dinner reservations for dinner at La Veranda and Le Grill; there are no reservations needed for L'Etoile. And don't miss afternoon teatime; the ship's pastries and desserts are amazing.

7/Authentic Polynesian Cultural Immersion—It's rare for a ship to so beautifully showcase a destination's culture. Sailing here year-round for more than 25 years, *The Gauguin* seamlessly carries French Polynesia's authentic personality throughout the

experience. Leading this is a fabulous onboard troupe of local Tahitian hosts and hostesses, Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins, who bring the Polynesian culture and spirit to life. It is rich, vibrant, and positive — and the soul of Tahiti permeates the entire ship.

This deep sense of place was meaningful for me. I enjoyed all the Polynesian specialties served at meals, enriching Polynesian entertainment, the ship's memorable Polynesian Night, and connections with local Tahitians. Longer itineraries allow for even more immersion.

PRO TIP: Take part in Polynesian activities and events and bring tropical-inspired clothes to wear for Polynesian Night. A selection is also available in the ship's well-stocked boutique.

**8/Exclusive Private Retreats**—The line's alluring private getaways are idyllic slices of heaven filled with memorable indulgences. The palm-fringed Motu Mahana, the line's exclusive islet off shore inTaha'a's unspoiled lagoon, is a feast for the senses. It is a guest favorite and the barbecue banquet here is a gastronomic delight. I loved snorkeling and swimming in the crystal-clear turquoise waters, enjoying tropical drinks

served in coconuts, and being serenaded with Tahitian melodies by Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins.

While there's so much to experience in Bora Bora, don't miss the line's stunning private beach with jaw-dropping views of Mount Otemanu. The sugary white sands and snorkeling opportunities are outstanding.

<u>PRO TIP</u>: Bring your ship-supplied snorkeling gear and water shoes with you to the private retreats.

**9/Watersports Marina**—French Polynesia is filled with extraordinary coral reefs and cerulean lagoons; it's paradise on Earth for watersports lovers. A highlight of my cruise was snorkeling through natural aquariums, surrounded by graceful rays and tropical fish in a kaleidoscope of colors.

There is a specially designed watersports platform at the back of the ship, perfect for launching complimentary kayaks and paddleboards. Watersports equipment is available at the private Bora Bora beach and on Motu Mahana, and guests can check out free snorkel equipment for the duration of their cruise. »



PRO TIP: If you plan to take advantage of The Gauguin's popular fee-based scuba diving activities, book your dives as soon as you're on board.

#### 10/Entertainment & Enrichment

**Programs**—There is an extensive array of engaging programs and outstanding entertainment throughout the day and evening. In addition to all the activities provided by Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins, there are special guest lectures, a wide variety of musical entertainment, and extravagant Polynesian performances. Remember, many resorts charge extra for these events.

Some of my favorite performances were the incredible French Polynesian folkloric shows of songs and dances by the Moorea Swing Boys and O Tahiti E local dance troupes. The crew show and musical entertainment in La Palette and the Piano Bar are superb.

PRO TIP: Allow plenty of time to enjoy the ship's activities and check the Daily Program each evening to plan your next day.

#### 11/Moana Explorer Program for Kids

—This is an extraordinary destination for families to make unforgettable memories

and celebrate special events together. There were a number of both families and multi-generational groups on our sailing who were thrilled with their experiences with some already planning their return trips.

The line's complimentary Moana Explorer Program features enriching activities and experiences for kids ages 6-15. Created in partnership with Te mana o te moana, a South Seas education and preservation foundation, the naturalist-led program includes daily fun-filled adventures and hands-on activities that help young guests learn about these islands, Tahitian culture, and marine life. This outstanding program is offered on certain sailings during the holidays and summer months.

PRO TIP: Many activities are outdoors and the sun's rays are intense. Families should pack long-sleeve rash guards, hats, and water shoes.

#### THE SOCIETY ISLANDS

This is the French Polynesia of your dreams. The one on vintage travel posters that has long inspired romantic wanderlust and artistic creativity, and that in 2022 was voted the World's Friendliest Destination (together with the Tuamotus and Marquesas) by the readers of *Condé Nast Traveler*. With their welcoming hospitality, turquoise lagoons, azure skies, and soaring mountain peaks, the Society Islands invite blissful relaxation on pristine beaches and thrilling discovery both undersea and on land. Verdant **TAHITI**, the largest island in French Polynesia, is all deep valleys

and rugged coastline. The iconic Mount Otemanu crowns BORA BORA's fabled lagoon filled with coral gardens teeming with marine wildlife and dotted with outlying motus. Heart-shaped MOOREA, known for its stunning mountains, palm-fringed beaches, and hypnotic lagoon waters, is said to be Michener's mythical Bali Hai. The "Garden Isle" of **HUAHINE** entices with well-preserved archaeological sites hidden amidst its rainforest, and TAHA'A—the vanilla island—plays host to MOTU MAHANA, Paul Gauguin Cruises' own private islet where an indulgently exclusive beach day is included on every itinerary. Cloaked in a lush landscape dotted with waterfalls and fertile valleys where the cloud-capped Mount Temehani reigns supreme, RAIATEA is the sacred homeland of the Maohi people.




#### TUAMOTU ARCHIPELAGO

To the east of the Society Islands lie the Tuamotus, the world's largest group of coral atolls representing the lowest point in French Polynesia. These 75 "flat islands" sit in striking contrast to their high "mountainous neighbors" found elsewhere in the region. But ahhh... the Tuamotus are a revered destination for divers and snorkeling aficionados, home to extraordinary reefs and marine flora and fauna. An underwater camera comes in handy here as you prepare to dive in and discover the rare Technicolor wonders thriving below the surface. FAKARAVA is an unspoiled paradise that lays claim to a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve while **RANGIROA** is often called the world's most immense natural aquarium—so large the entire island of Tahiti could sit within it. "Rangi," as it's known by the locals, is known for its Tahitian pearls, too.

#### THE COOK ISLANDS

Due west of French Polynesia are the Cook Islands, an unspoiled paradise recognized by *Lonely Planet* as a Top Country in its 2022 *Best in Travel*. Here there are no branded resorts and no buildings taller than a coconut tree. Most of the islands' inhabitants are Cook Island Maori and their vibrant culture permeates through the arts of music, storytelling, and native dance. In fact, upon arrival in **RAROTONGA**, the archipelago's hub, you might be greeted by the sounds of beating drums and ukuleles. Richly covered in mountains that soar more than 2,000 feet above clear-blue seas, Rarotonga boasts sugar-white sands, coral reefs, and nearly untouched lagoons. A visit to **AITUTAKI**, a triangle-shaped atoll covered in palms and sugary sands, affords access to One Foot Island, considered one of Polynesia's best beaches.



lose your eyes and picture a landscape of dreams. A strand of tiny islets shimmering in the South Seas—clad in emerald peaks, ringed by iridescent reefs, and infused with the Ifloral aromas of Eden itself.

It's no wonder the enchantments of Tahiti, Huahine, Taha'a, Bora Bora, and Moorea have become the stuff of legend, forever capturing the imaginations of all those fortunate enough to happen upon these shores. After experiencing this week-long voyage aboard the m/s Paul Gauguin, you'll be able to count yourself and your travel companions among them.

What's more, you'll share all that castaway bliss while immersed daily in the casual five-star sophistication of a ship purpose-built for exploring this region. Intimate in scale, equipped for adventure, and renowned for its joie de vivre and warm personal service.

OK. You can open your eyes now. And begin to prepare for the proverbial adventure of a lifetime.

## Tahiti & the Society Islands

TAHITI Sporting its signature triple crown of volcanic peaks, the island of Tahiti seems well aware of its nickname. "Oueen of the Pacific." And justifiably proud of its majestic role as both capital of French Polynesia and everyday namesake of the Society Islands archipelago.

Awaiting you in the harbor is The Gauguin. You're no doubt eager to board your new floating home, and you'll soon find the onboard staff just as excited to welcome you as their guest. Once settled in, though, the temptation to check out Papeete's vibrant waterfront might prove irresistible. Known for its lively markets and welcoming locals, the atmosphere is a unique blend of French sophistication, Polynesian warmth, and tropical charm.

But don't dawdle; your ship sails for Huahine this evening.

HUAHINE In the crisp light of early morning, The Garden Island flaunts its wondrous beauty. Fellow travelers are already on deck snapping photos and exclaiming as you indulge in a leisurely breakfast in bed.

Exquisitely green and astoundingly tranguil, Huahine remains one of French Polynesia's most unspoiled gems a cultural sanctuary brimming with intriguing archeological sites, fragrant vanilla plantations, and mountainsides bursting with breadfruit, bananas, coconuts, and other tropical bounty.

An excursion here is a must: there's so much to see. Ancient *maraes* (temples) dating back to 700 AD. Curious stone fish traps in Lake Maeva and even more curious sacred blue-eyed eels (that's right), handfed daily in a stream near Faie village. A local pearl farm reached by outrigger and a Belvedere offering jaw-dropping outlooks over Maroe Bay.

Feeling like some cardio, with an electric assist? Consider signing up for Huahine Iti by E-bike, a 16-mile pedal around Huahine's smaller twin isle-with a wellearned swim or snorkel break at a whitesand beach along Avea Bay.

There are a dozen ways to spend your day here. All of them equally magical.

#### TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

How's this for an intriguing Tropics Fact: The "bean" we know as vanilla isn't a bean at all, but the slender seed pod of a vining orchid whose flowers need to be fertilized by hand. That delicate maneuver is performed countless times each season here in the vanilleries of Taha'a-and gourmets and aromatherapists 'round the world get to enjoy their much-prized Tahitian vanilla. Sweet! You'll likely catch its intoxicating scent even as The Gauguin anchors offshore.

Day-to-day life on this serene, flowershaped isle is on no one's schedule, except perhaps that of Mother Nature, who clearly reigns supreme here. With her kind permission, several excursions offer opportunities for an up-close and personal Taha'a inspection. Like say, Exploration of Taha'a, a guided 4x4 foray that traverses a high mountain, ventures inside a typical vanilla plantation, and tours a coastal farm that grows lustrous black Tahitian pearls.

But you might find it tough to do much at all, when confronted with the laid-back beauty of this place. No worries; got you



covered there, too. Simply hop the tender to **Motu Mahana**, *The Gauguin*'s own private islet nestled within Taha'a's languid lagoon. It's a truly Tahitian refuge where your ship's troupe of resident cultural ambassadors, Les Gauguines, welcomes you in classic South Seas style—and your time is your own.

Savor a swim in gin-clear waters.
Slide beneath the surface for some reef snorkeling. Grab a beverage from the floating bar and a chaise under the palms. Test your serve in an impromptu beach volleyball game or paddle paradise by kayak. And enjoy the music, fun, and barbeque of a Motu Mahana beach picnic many guests say is one of the high points of their cruise.

#### BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT)

Ask 1,000 people to name one island that most evokes images of South Pacific romance, and 999 will likely say Bora Bora. Yet as spectacular as it looks in photos and films, the in-real-life experience of arriving here aboard the m/s Paul Gauguin will positively take your breath away. Luckily you've got two full days to catch it... if you can.

Your backdrop is the cathedral-like Mount Otemanu, wrapped in velvety green and soaring skyward above a showstopping ring lagoon where turquoise water sparkles and Technicolor marine life inhabits the coral gardens below.

Feeling aqua-curious? Meet some of the lagoon's most graceful undersea denizens on a **Sharks & Stingrays Encounter**. Wading

into the sandy shallows, enjoy a visit from gentle rays accustomed to company and happy to perform their balletic dance for you, your guide, and the squads of harmless blacktip reef sharks spectating from the fringes of this outing. Other peak watery excursions include reef snorkeling, aquasafari underwater walks, aquabike scootering, waverunner escapades, and sunset sails by catamaran or outrigger.

In the mood to explore on terra firma? **The Bora Bora Off-Road Adventure** pursues the road less traveled to unveil the island's abundant natural beauty, expansive mountain views, even cannon emplacements left over from the Pacific battles of WWII.

Of course, you might prefer to just yield to the lazy luxury of time spent at the private Bora Bora beach retreat reserved for guests of *The Gauguin* alone. Bask, wander, sip, snorkel, paddleboard, or simply drift through daydreams in a spot where they come spectacularly to life.

MOOREA (OVERNIGHT) Meet the nonfiction version of James Michener's mythic "Bali Hai." It's not uncommon for newcomers to gasp aloud as they first lay eyes on this intensely scenic island—so steeped in mystery and tropical exuberance. Just 11 miles from bustling Tahiti, Moorea is a heart-shaped, welcoming paradise where cares are suspended in time, smiles come naturally, and change proceeds at a sea snail's pace.

Waterfalls cascade from eight volcanic peaks surrounding gorgeous twin turquoise

lagoons. Ferns and orchids climb the jungle canopy. Fragrant pineapples ripen in the sun. Dolphins cavort. And humpback whales gather to mate. It's enough to awaken anyone's inner Gauguin, and you're definitely on the right ship for that.

Having two days here leaves plenty of room for variety. Perhaps a SCUBA excursion or motu snorkeling, a bracing cata jet spin around the lagoon, or a paddleboard/kayak session off the ship's watersports marina. Or maybe you'd prefer the pro-guided **Capture Moore Photo Adventure** that brings ancient *maraes*, lush forests, epic mountainside panoramas, and even an extinct volcano crater into focus. Or an island-wide **Aito Off-Road Safari** that includes sampling of local Moorean jam, ice cream, and field-fresh fruit juice. That's a yum.

#### PAPEETE, TAHITI (OVERNIGHT)

What a week this has been! As you contemplate how you can feel so relaxed AND energized at the same time, *The Gauguin* pulls into Papeete harbor. As twilight yields to starlight on this final shipboard evening, perhaps you'll stroll over to Vai'ete Square to be tempted once more by those *Roulotte* food trucks or to browse the shops for that last special memento or a bauble to go along with the gorgeous pearls you found at *The Gauguin's* onboard boutique.

Come morning, you'll depart the ship. But your imagination might linger behind. Patiently awaiting your return voyage.



## POLYNESIAN CULTURE: TATOOS

## Tatau, the body speaks



#### **Identity** card

"Ta-tau, ta-tau, ta-tau"... This mysterious rhythmic pattern was first heard by explorer James Cook during his expedition to the South Pacific seas. It is the melody of the Polynesian tattoo artist knocking together: a wooden handle with a small comb attached—made of bone, shark teeth, or tortoise shell—and a mallet that the tattoo artist taps to prick the skin.

For nearly 3,000 years, islanders throughout all Polynesia have been using their bodies as a canvas to 'engrave' their history, genealogy, and life's important events. The *tatau* was a rite of passage, intended to mark an identity, the passage of time, a social rank, or a personality. These designs effectively replace writing in ancient Polynesian societies, which are rich in oral traditions.

#### Everyone has a story

Over the centuries, each archipelago developed its own art of tattooing. From a mountainous island to a palm-lined atoll, the styles and symbols differ. While Marquesan *tikis* (representations of Polynesian demigods) symbolize protection and power, the fish is a mark of prosperity, the turtle indicates good health and family, and birds and waves represent travel and spirituality.

A *tatau*'s placement is also important. On the shoulder it is a sign of strength and bravery, on the torso it expresses generosity and sincerity, and on the head it symbolizes wisdom.

## Renaissance of an art form, and respect for a culture

Deemed 'barbaric' by European missionaries, the traditional practice of tattooing was outlawed. Nearly 200 years later, the art of *tatau* has returned to its former glory. And although today's techniques have been largely modernized, some tattooists continue to perpetuate the skills of their ancestors and, through them, the history and culture of Polynesia.







The same two dining venues offered lunch options that were equally as sumptuous. I could enjoy lighter fare, or go all out with a full-course meal—including special culinary stations (for example, pasta or stir fry), carving stations for meat lovers, and a dessert buffet. **Insider tip:** Each day lunch featured a different nationality: French, Italian, Spanish, Pacific, Greek, even American. Part of the fun was finding out which cuisine was being served!

At Le Grill, a casual dining venue, I enjoyed breathtaking island views and sunlight glinting off the pool. The same fare that was up for grabs at Le Grill came together as a more chic spread in La Veranda's cool, blue dining room, with its crisp linens, floor-to-ceiling windows, and elegant ambiance. Dining *al fresco* was also an option at La Veranda.

## Every Dinner's a Party

Nothing's more fun than a dinner party—especially when you don't have to do the cooking! What suited my mood each night? I chose from three restaurants, each with open seating arrangements, and each with its own menu and team of talented chefs.

L'Etoile, the main restaurant, offered fine dining at its best. Each time I dined there the Maître d'escorted me to my table, whether it was an intimate table for two, or a dinner party of ten. If I felt social and wanted to meet new people, I even had the choice of joining other open parties at their table. Several times I arranged impromptu get-togethers over dinner with friends I'd met during the week—easy to do since L'Etoile doesn't require reservations.

The décor is stylish, accented with wood tones, ceramics, and chandeliers. The dress code is coined "country club casual," and it was easy to enjoy the elegance of perfect mood lighting and decadent furnishings as devoted staff poured my favorite wine. A full-course, à la carte menu of gourmet delights including appetizers, soups, salads, international specialties, a cheese course, and dessert was at my bidding. On occasion, I lingered, visiting with fellow foodies, over a cup of coffee or tea. **Insider fave:** Though the menu changes nightly, there is a set of delicious "classics" available every night. My favorite? That would be the perfectly seasoned, perfectly prepared beef medallions. *Mmm*.

Light-filled and airy for lunch and breakfast, La Veranda was transformed into a romantic French venue, effusing a warm glow in the evening. I learned early in »

I could sit down with a single friend, or a group of up to seven shipmates, and savor a full course menu of Polynesian favorites, skillfully paired with wines. **Insider tip:** Making reservations when the ship overnights in Bora Bora may reward you with a poolside table under the stars

## Late, Early & In-Between


TEA TIME | 24-HOUR ROOM SERVICE

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

Luring divers from all over the world, Fakarava's sprawling lagoon and reef provide a home and underwater nursery for precious marine fauna found nowhere else. Whether you opt for a 90-minute Fakarava Pinnacle Snorkel excursion or a full-day Tour of South Pass & Tetamanu, you'll experience some of Mother Nature's finest subsurface handiwork.

Of course, as with the rest of the South Pacific, landside adventure here proves just as tempting. Perhaps a relaxed e-bike spin through a verdant coconut grove along the coast? The pyramidal Topaka lighthouse along the route is among the oldest in Polynesia, and the handsome coral church on Fakarava's southern tip has weathered the test of time and tropics since the 1870s.

With two days to explore this "Island of Dreams," you'll soon understand how it earned its name.

RANGIROA Picture a crystal-blue lagoon so vast the entire island of Tahiti could fit within it, encircled by 240 palmy sand islets and parked above one of the planet's most vibrant coral reef systems. If Rangiroa wasn't already on your bucket list, you'll soon be correcting the omission.

Experience the drift-snorkel of your dreams on a Snorkelling Rangiroa's 'Aquarium' excursion, as a fluorescent menagerie of undersea life awaits your visit to their coral gardens. For a more adventurous session, consider a SCUBA Motu Nuhi Nuhi trip to a spot frequented by hammerhead sharks in summer (Dec-Mar), and colorful fish of every stripe throughout the year.

Bask Crusoe-style on a pink-sand beach or cavort in a Reef Island swim hole. Visit a Blue Lagoon in a blue lagoon. Spot Tuamotu sandpipers at a seabird sanctuary. Catch wild dolphins leaping at Tiputa Point, or watch parrot fish, black-tip sharks, and huge Napoleon wrasse swim by beneath your dry feet on a Glass-bottom Boat Tour over Tiputa Channel.



More into landlubbing? Wander picturesque Avatoru village or venture a bit farther down the road to the vineyard responsible for French Polynesia's only wine label, Vin de Tahiti.

HUAHINE A fresh day brings the promise of lush discoveries here on "The Garden Island." Everywhere your eye lands is deep, verdant green—or a thousand shades of shimmering blue. Life is quiet here; the jungle holds its secrets close, hinting at their richness with the sounds and scents of paradise.

Huahine was once the playground of Tahitian royalty; today it's yours. The island's historical allure is the stuff of legends, with maraes (temples), monuments, and archaeological relics dating back to the birth of the Polynesian culture. The Gauguin's anthropologistled Sacred Sites & Legendary Places excursion visits Maeva, where many of these are concentrated, as well as a working vanilla plantation and a village where you'll meet—and feed—the famous blue-eyed eels of Faie.

#### BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT) The

name alone triggers runaway romantic notions. But oh, what passion the reality of two days in Bora Bora will inspire. It's no wonder this jewel-like island with its slice-of-heaven lagoon is such a go-to for weddings, honeymoons, vow renewals and spontaneous declarations of love.

Your days here can be casual, barefoot, unhurried. Especially at The Gauguin's exclusive beach retreat where time and cares evaporate in the Polynesian breeze. Snorkel, sunbathe, paddleboard, or simply float about in water so turquoise it appears on no color chart on Earth.

Bring active adventure into the equation with excursions like a Sharks & Stingray Encounter, a Bora Bora Off-Road **Adventure** that ascends the steeps to jaw-dropping overlooks and cannon emplacements left behind here after WWII. Maybe even take to the lagoon for an adrenaline-fueled Circle Island by Waverunner.

No matter how splendid you've imagined this South Seas paradise to be, it's all that and more.

RAIATEA Polynesia's most mythic island is a contender for most scenic, too, with its landscape blanketed in ginger and waterfalls and its skyline defined by misty Mount Temehani. It was from these turquoise shores that the ancient Maohi launched their double-hulled sailing canoes to settle in Hawaii, New Zealand, and beyond.

Perhaps you'll launch your own craft today, and kayak the Faaroa River. Or enjoy a drift-snorkel in Raiatea's crystalline lagoon, shared with neighboring Taha'a. You might explore Raiatea's top viewpoints by open-air safari truck, or visit the UNESCO-listed Marae Taputapuatea archaeological complex and sense the 1,000-year-old spirit of this isle whose name translates to "faraway heaven."

#### TAHA'A | MOTU MAHANA |

Foremost on today's agenda: vanquish any troubles, deadlines, or responsibilities with a Motu Mahana beach day. Paul Gauguin Cruises' private Polynesian islet offers sun, swaying palms, thatched huts, amiable chatter, and plenty of ukulele. Stroll the soft sand motu barefoot. Queue up your entrant in a spirited sandcrab race or toss up your serve in a boisterous beach

volleyball game. Quench your hunger and thirst with cool drinks from a floating bar and a barbeque lunch served as al fresco as they come.

Elsewhere on Taha'a, alternate adventures await. Quaint villages perfect for browsing. Island lanes perfect for cycling. Ancient hiking trails and 4x4 treks into mountain jungle. And everywhere, the intoxicating scent of paradise.

MOOREA Heart-shaped Moorea seems designed for celebrating love. Its eight craggy volcanic peaks tower over twin lagoons. Waterfalls and fern carpets cascade down the hillsides while coffee, sugarcane, and pineapples ripen in the valleys. Sparkling waist-deep water blankets the shorelines. And Spinner dolphins leap acrobatically among the waves. Don't bother trying to resist this allure; it's not possible.

Instead, surrender to the myriad possibilities: Ascend to the isle's ancient crater on an Aito Off-Road Safari. Experience a subsurface stroll along the lagoon floor with reef fish and rays for company on an Aquablue Underwater Walk. Explore by e-bike, waverunner, small plane, catamaran, mountain trail, or ATV.

When it's time to sail onward, hug yourself and those around you. That's the Moorean way.

#### PAPEETE, TAHITI (OVERNIGHT)

Alas, like all life's finest journeys, your m/s Paul Gauguin voyage must end. Enriched, relaxed, and with a very fond adieu to the many staff and new friends you've gotten to know, you'll disembark this morning. But perhaps only for a while. Tahiti and her sister islands cast a spell not easily broken.



And while (fortunately) you won't see any signage, the atmosphere here is indeed one of relaxing bliss, as if a tonic of calm were sprinkled on the sea breeze. Add the tropical serenity and low-key vibe of the Cook Islands to the route and you won't have a care in the world... other than getting into the water or going ashore.

Sound tempting? Book this 11-night itinerary and you're on your way. To adventures above and below the turquoise sea. To emerald mountains and sugar-white beaches. To enchanting customs and enduring legends. And, above all, to a South Pacific world of relaxation, discovery, and runaway romance.

Discover the remote Cook Islands, from rugged Rarotonga to watery Aitutaki. Relish two-day stays in bucket-list perennials Bora Bora and Moorea. Visit the vanilla-scented rainforests of Huahine. And find your bliss on The Gauguin's own private Taha'a beach islet.

# **Cook Islands & Society Islands**

TAHITI Long known as the "Queen of the Pacific," the island of Tahiti is quite used to admiring glances. You'll no doubt be casting a few of your own on its triple-peak magnificence as you board the m/s Paul Gauguin in Papeete harbor.

Welcomed by a crew and staff genuinely thrilled to have you along, you'll find plenty to admire right here on the ship that will serve as your own personal harbor for the next while. Departing port as the sun descends, feel your spirits begin to soar.

HUAHINE Tucked shyly between Tahiti and Bora Bora, the Garden Island of Huahine is actually two islands—said to have been separated eons ago by a local god's canoe and blanketed like twins by a plush coral reef. Rich in cultural artifacts and redolent of vanilla vines, this wonderfully underdeveloped Eden is a tranquil refuge that progress has wonderfully overlooked.

Reef-lovers might opt for the waterborne Island Tour & Snorkeling excursion. Landrovers can seek adventure on 4WD, ATV, or e-bike outings. And archaeology enthusiasts can marvel at the famous maraes (ancient Polynesian temples) of Maeva on a Cultural Highlights of Huahine tour.

AT SEA Above all else, days at sea are for indulging. And The Gauguin's chefs have definitely seen to that. From deckside breakfast accompanied by sea breezes at La Veranda to theme-driven poolside lunching at Le Grill, and on to high-style Afternoon Tea replete with finger sandwiches and petit fours. As the sun settles, the culinary options elevate: L'Etoile sets its linens for multicoursed, wine-paired deliciousness. Le Grill shifts to Asian-Pacific and finned fare. And La Veranda brings artful French dining to heights as tall as its wraparound glass walls.

AITUTAKI Bid adieu (temporarily) to French Polynesia and say g'day to Aitutaki in the Cook Islands, politically allied with faroff New Zealand but deeply tied to it Maori tradition through song, dance, and crafts like the intricate patchwork quilts known as tivaevae handsewn with love and colorful fabrics by the local matriarchs.

Several hundred fish species add still more local color, inhabiting the reefs of a vast triangular central lagoon framed by low-lying, palm-shaded islets. Kiteboarders ride the trade winds across the shallows, scooterists circumnavigate the island for the fun of it, and hikers make easy work of trekking

to Maunga Pu, the isle's non-lofty summit, rewarded with sensational 360-degree vistas.

Another Aitutaki high point is One Foot Island, a beach with few peers for beauty and even fewer for post offices: the one here is among the world's tiniest and most remote. The Gauguin's Lagoon Cruise and Beach Break excursion lunches here and calls on other must-see island locales. A shorter Snorkeling **Tour** brings you to Motu Maina, home to famously giant clams and vibrant birdlife.

RAROTONGA It's the hub of the Cooks—yet small-town in stature. No building taller than a coconut tree. And no traffic lights, since there's scant traffic. What is here are fabulous sugar-sand beaches, lushly rugged interior mountains, and the unmistakable island sound of drumbeats and ukulele riffs. The perfume of frangipani floats in the air, while palm fronds rustle in the onshore breeze. Overall, not a bad place at all to find yourself this day.

Will you spend it on an offroad Raro Safari by 4WD, calling on inland villages to get a real sense of islander life? Steeped in tropical and marine beauty on a Muri Lagoon Cruise? Or maybe at Takitumu Conservation Centre, seeking a sighting of



the elusive kakerori flycatcher found only here. No matter what, it will be a Raro treat.

AT SEA Waking up to a fresh day at sea, feel how the amazing sights, sounds, and tastes you've experienced so far are fueling your sense of wellbeing. Daydream or dive into a novel on the Sun Deck as the South Pacific landscape drifts by. Channel your inner artist by sketching or painting. Ask your onboard cultural hosts, Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins, for tips and techniques on mastering Polynesian craft-making. Tackle making a basket from coconut fronds, learn the ancient art of *tapa* barkcloth, create your own jewelry from natural materials found on the islands. And celebrate your mastery with a Tahitian vanilla crème brûlée.

#### BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT)

This morning finds you back in the warm embrace of French Polynesia, anchored for a pair of play days on the South Pacific's supermodel island, Bora Bora. It looks every bit as glamorous as all those magazine covers it's starred on. But this is better; this is inreal-life.

With so much to do and see, your time here will require some decisioning. First and foremost, there's the water. Dazzling, warm, and inviting, Bora Bora's lagoon offers positively cinematic beauty for snorkelers and divers. And exotic up-close encounters with gentle stingrays and shy sharks. The scene's also jaw-dropping above the surface where catamaran sails, kayaking, jet boating, aquabiking, and waverunner tours are among the options. As we said, tough call.

Then there's the land to consider. Guided hikes, ATV adventures, ancient temples to explore. The half-day **Bora Bora Off-Road Adventure** leaves the pavement in the rearview on a rollicking exploration of the island's considerable natural beauty and interesting WWII history.

Should you prefer to do little more than float in bathtub-glorious ocean water and sip cool refreshments along an exquisite beach framed by iconic Mount Otemanu views, *The Gauguin's* private Bora Bora beach retreat is waiting.

By the way: brace yourself for ravishing sunsets. They're a Bora Bora trademark.

#### TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Its deliciously fragrant botanical secret will excite your senses even before you arrive. This is the Vanilla Island, where 80% of French Polynesia's gourmet-prized crop is grown. Graced by lush beaches and crowned by volcanic slopes clad in pineapple and banana fields, this flower-shaped paradise is as dreamy as Bora Bora, yet exquisitely undeveloped.

Seasoned snorkelers love the Coral Garden Drift Snorkel, where the current carries divers and their guides single file through a lagoon brimming with brilliant fish and graceful corals (or is it the other way round?). The Exploration of Taha'a excursion keeps dry, traversing high mountains by off-road vehicle and visiting a local vanillerie and Tahitian black pearl farm.

That said, a freeform day on *The Gauguin's* private beach haven, **Motu Mahana**, might be just what floats your boat. This tiny islet features swaying palms, kayaking and

other watersports, beach volleyball, and an overwater massage situation. Oh, and a floating bar serving up your favorite beverages plus a sumptuous daily barbeque. Hard to resist.

MOOREA (OVERNIGHT) No two ways about it (though there are two bays about it), Moorea is as stunning as French Polynesia gets—its signature heart shape created by Cook's and Opunohu Bays with dramatic Mt. Rotui parked between them. In addition to its undeniably great looks, Moorea brims with stunning opportunities for adventure during your two-day sojourn.

One popular example is the **Dolphin**Watching Expedition, led by a marine biologist and focused on the wild, freeranging Spinner and rough-toothed dolphins that frequent Moorea's lagoon. For an even loftier vantage point on what's in the water, there's a scenic island flyover excursion by small plane. And for photography enthusiasts, a pro-guided **Capture Moorea** outing scouring the island from beach to peak in quest of the perfect image.

For a fully human-powered thrill, the trail to the Magic Mountain Overlook takes under an hour and rewards hikers with views of a lifetime.

#### PAPEETE, TAHITI (OVERNIGHT)

Back to the harbor where the voyage began, already? Where did the time go? In your journal, perhaps. And certainly, it's been logged in your best-of-the-best memory banks for regular recall. After a final evening aboard, you'll bid farewell to the South Seas. Until the next trip, anyway.




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

Romance, luxury, beauty, relaxation, adventure—all are thoroughly explored as you voyage from island to island in an arc around the storied South Pacific.

Savor the relaxed luxury of shipboard life aboard the m/s *Paul Gauguin* even as you venture into the mountainous wilds of the Marquesas Islands. Soak up days of picture-perfect dreaminess in the fabled Society Islands and be immersed in fluorescent underwater wonders in the Tuamotu Archipelago.

Lose all track of time, gain a fresh perspective on the beauty of our planet, and find yourself transformed by the experience.

# Marquesas, Tuamotus & Society Islands

TAHITI The Gauguin awaits you in the harbor of Papeete, Tahiti's capital. As you board, notice the energy here in the waterfront with shoppers eyeing the fruits and flowers, crafts and souvenirs, and local Tahitian goods. For all the urbane sophistication of this 'big' city, its backdrop of dramatic green mountains gives the scene an unmistakably Polynesian vibe. The perfect intro to the journey to come.

AT SEA Morning finds you reveling in your first day at sea as the South Pacific trade winds gently carry off the stresses of everyday life. Consider today Chapter One of an as-yet-unwritten South Seas epic. Will yours be a romance? A fantasy? An adventure? Perhaps all of these. But for now, surrender to the comforts of this beautiful vessel that will serve as your floating home during the journey. This ease could be habit-forming!

FAKARAVA Welcome to Mother Nature's showplace in the Tuamotus, an island sought out by divers from all over the planet for its incomparable bounty of marine life. Fakarava is one of just seven UNESCO Biosphere Reserves in the world, its vast rectangular lagoon providing a uniquely pristine coral nursery for fish and crustaceans of every stripe, as well as a cruising ground for manta and eagle rays, hammerhead sharks, dolphins, and turtles.

The atoll's landside riches are considerable as well, among them a church in Tetamanu built entirely of coral by missionaries in 1874—

and one of the oldest and most photogenic lighthouses in Polynesia, shaped like a pyramid. Strolling or cycling along splendid beaches reveals a lush menagerie of tropical plants and colorful avians.

AT SEA Is there anything more glamorous than lounging on the deck of a ship as the South Seas horizon drifts past? Unlikely. Whether your agenda this day involves occupying a chaise with a tropical libation in hand and a novel at the ready or chatting poolside with newfound travel friends, *The Gauguin* is designed for your absolute pleasure.

The dining is enticing. The fitness center and spa, invigorating. Your onboard hosts, Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins, are leading Tahitian dance lessons and hands-on craftmaking workshops. Soon it will be Golden Hour, when another spectacular Polynesian sunset will be queued up. Followed by starlight that defies description.

FATU HIVA As if in deliberate contrast to the low-lying Tuamotus, the mountainous Marquesas vault out of the Pacific to reach ruggedly dramatic heights. Deep indigo swells pound against jagged sea cliffs so tall, misty clouds drop down to meet them. No coral lagoons or sandy beaches here, but ample natural and cultural riches await.

Beautiful in its isolation, Fatu Hiva sits at the southern end of the chain, an "off the radar" paradise with no airstrip, a mere 500 residents, and just one road linking its two small villages—though what a scenic wonder that drive is!

In addition to ancient petroglyphs and the renowned beaten-bark tapa cloth handicrafts made by its local artisans, Fatu Hiva's luxuriant jungle gorges, plunging waterfalls, and stunning Bay of Virgins make excursions here a sensual delight.

HIVA OA Of all the islands in Polynesia, master Post-Impressionist Paul Gauguin and famed songwriter Jacques Brel both chose Hiva Oa to spend their final years and to rest for eternity at Calvaire Cemetery. Their works live on here, too, enshrined at cultural centers in the island's principal settlement, Atuona. Curiously, this village is also a favorite of the yachting set, imparting a distinctly cosmopolitan vibe to this otherwise rugged island.

Attention explorers: With its deep valleys, weathered peaks, and velvety rainforests, Hiva Oa's interior holds many hidden secrets, including massive stone carvings and ancient petroglyphs whose true meanings have yet to be fully explained. An unforgettable off-road **Atuona to Taaoa** excursion leads you to beautifully preserved ceremonial sites, dwellings, and sacred archaeological ruins, including enormous tikis, sacrificial altars, and thousand-year-old relics—among the most significant in the Marquesas.



TAHUATA Its name means "sunrise" in Marquesan and you'll arrive at diminutive Tahuata soon after that time this morning. The vibe here is classic South Seas as you stroll into the quaint village of Hapatoni along an ancient royal walkway scented by fragrant tiare flowers and shaded by sacred tamanu trees. In the open-air marketplace, friendly locals display carved wood tikis and other handicrafts.

For a deeper take on the island, consider the **Hapatoni Discovery** tour—traversing lush wilderness by all-terrain to reach unspoiled villages, an intriguing small historical museum in Viatahu, and a scenic lookout framed by rugged peaks.

NUKU HIVA Already largest of the Marquesas, Nuku Hiva may also qualify as the most wildly scenic. Rugged cliffs plunge down into the ocean, their flanks carpeted in deep green jungle. Giant banyan trees and wild horses range free. Shadows play on the shoreline and knife-edged peaks slice through clouds afloat in an azure sky.

It's no surprise this primal landscape captured the world's imagination when novelist Herman Melville described it in *Typee*, his real-life travelogue published in 1846. Having gone AWOL from his whaling ship only to find himself a guest-slash-captive of the indigenous locals for weeks, he introduced the world to Nuku Hiva and its spectacular Taipivai Valley.

You can experience a much less rigorous introduction to this anthropological landmark on the **Visit of Taipivai Valley** excursion. Prepare to be captivated yourself.

AT SEA With the Marquesas now in her wake and two relaxing sea days ahead as *The Gauguin* makes for the Society Islands, you're once again reminded that many of a journey's most enjoyable experiences don't even require setting foot off the ship.

Catch informative guest lectures and voyage-related film screenings at Le Grand Salon (don't get any crazy ideas from *Mutiny on the Bounty!*). Savor the everchanging parade of regionally inspired dining menus and behind-the-scenes cooking demos by the executive chef. Share anecdotes and cocktails with like-minded travelers. And dabble in the trivia, chess, and bridge games underway.

HUAHINE In case you weren't certain from its appearance, yes, you've just arrived in the Garden of Eden's Polynesia branch. Impossibly green and delightfully under-visited, Huahine remains the best-kept secret in the Society Islands, presided over by a populace known for the warmth of their welcome.

Wander among eight tiny villages spread over two islands. Graze the waterfront eateries of Fare, visit a *vanillerie*, tour ancient temples and mythical sites in Maeva, or glide below the turquoise water's surface to marvel at Huahine's lagoon reefs. Decisions, decisions.

BORA BORA Soaring volcano peaks, impossibly green jungles, flowers exploding with color and scent, and a lagoon so blue it defies description. Like a romance novel brought vividly to life, Bora Bora takes your breath away. And no one is immune.

Whether you spend your day at bliss on *The Gauguin's* private lagoon beach, touring Bora Bora by Le Truck, thrilling to a **Sharks & Stingrays Encounter**, or spotting the celebs at Bloody Mary's on Pofai Bay—you're in for a treat.

#### TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

You open your eyes this morning and notice a volcano-peaked emerald off your balcony, floating in a setting of glittering lapis. This is not some beautiful dream, it's Taha'a—luring you onward for a day full of fresh discoveries.

This island is known for its vanilla, a commodity as coveted as Tahitian black pearls. The **Exploration of Taha'a** excursion provides

up-close exposure to both these treasures, calling on a family-owned vanilla plantation and a working pearl farm. Along the way, some adventurous off-road exploring happens as your driver traverses a high mountain and meandering coastline.

Throughout the day, your ship's tender whisks guests to and from **Motu Mahana**, the private offshore beach islet reserved for *The Gauguin's* guests only. 





et ready for the delightful confusion of cruising across the International Dateline–"If it's Tuesday, it must be Tonga. (Or is it Wednesday?)"—as you embark on this unhurried twoweek odyssey through the South Pacific's most enthralling archipelagos. Depending on which direction you start from, Tahiti or Lautoka, you'll gain or lose a calendar day as you cross the 180th meridian. But you'll never lose your sense of wonder at where you've been and what you've seen.

Among the high points: a string of days immersed in the picture-book beauty of the Society Islands, including legendary Moorea and Bora Bora; a sojourn in the unspoiled Cook Islands, recognized as a Top Country by Lonely Planet in its Best in Travel 2022; a visit to the welcoming Kingdom of Tonga, aka "The Friendly Isles;" and adventurous explorations of three different islands of Fiji, where the Melanesian and Polynesian cultures meld in an exotic mélange.

# Fiji, Tonga, Cook & Society Islands

(This itinerary also operates in reverse.)

TAHITI Its name conjures images of relaxed tropical allure, yet the island of Tahiti Nui boasts a distinctly energetic vibe this evening. The m/s Paul Gauguin looks radiant, berthed under the backdrop of three volcanos in Papeete harbor, where a sprawling marché offers lively grazing for produce, flowers and colorful handcrafts.

MOOREA Second only to Bora Bora for fantasy honeymooning, heart-shaped Moorea beams with eternal beautylooking as young and unabashed as when James Cook first sailed by 250 years ago. Often described as Earth's most captivating setting, this eight-peaked island wraps its lush mountainous arms around gorgeous twin bays—Opunohu and Cook's—the whole lot surrounded by a sapphire lagoon that rivals any paradise your imagination can picture.

It's practically impossible to avoid feeling content around here. Even the marine mammals that frequent these waters seem especially happy—which you can opt to observe for yourself on an expert-led Dolphin Watching Expedition. Prefer to seek your joy landside this day? Consider the Aito Off-Road Safari or ATV Guided Tour, each transporting you inland to spectacular terrain and uphill to views that will definitely put a big smile on your face.

#### TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

This botanically rich island is actually shaped like a giant flower and perfumed by the scent of luscious Tahitian vanilla that proliferates here. Encircling its shoreline is a stunning necklace of coral reefs dotted with tiny motus (beach islets), including one knockout known as Motu Mahanaexpressly for the private enjoyment of The Gauguin's guests.

Welcomed ashore by your journey's cultural hosts, Les Gauguines, you'll find everything from luxurious sun lounging and overwater spa sessions to pick-up beach volleyball, kayaking, snorkeling, and refreshing potables served from a floating bar. A Tahitian barbeque feast rounds out the comforts.

#### BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT)

Rising skyward from its preposterously photogenic lagoon and crowned by iconic Mount Otemanu, Bora Bora has been the world's favorite fantasy romance destination for generations. Waking up here after a midnight arrival, you'll have a very full day to soak up the glamour of it all.

Myriad excursions are on the roster, from guided volcano hikes to 4x4 tours, ATV adventures, and waterborne explorations by waverunner, aquabike, glass-bottom boat, and catamaran.

Prefer a firsthand look at what's going on below the waterline? Sign on for a mellow Lagoonarium outing, a multi-stop snorkeling tour, or the always-thrilling Sharks & Stingrays Encounter.

Feeling lazier than that? Don't fight it; enjoy a deliciously tranquil escape at The Gauguin's private Bora Bora beach retreat.

AT SEA Sea days on The Gauguin are for mastering the art of relaxation. Setting the tone with breakfast in bed. Spending a while reviewing and posting some of the incredible photos you've already accumulated. Getting your cardio in gear at the fitness center and your skin glowing at the Algotherm Spa. Sampling the smoothie of the day, lunching al fresco with newfound friends at La Veranda, nibbling crustless sandwiches and petit fours at Afternoon Tea. Napping poolside or up on the Sun Deck, dreaming of how you might continue this daily rhythm indefinitely.

AITUTAKI Get ready for drums, grass skirts, tikis, storytelling... and giant clams. You've arrived in Aitutaki in the Cook Islands, settled a thousand years ago by the legendary Polynesian explorer Ru and still deeply connected to its ancient ways.

Now, about those clams: The island's coral barrier reef encloses a vast triangular



lagoon many in the know consider top-tier for fish and mollusk diversity. Several hundred lucky species make a home here—damselfish, butterflyfish, Picasso triggers, and lots of vibrant Tridacna maxima, aka giant clams. Ponder their considerable size for yourself during the snorkeling portion of the Lagoon Cruise & Beach Break excursion, which also involves a barbeque lunch on the sand at ultra-scenic One Foot Island and tropical birdwatching at Honeymoon Island.

Craving a dry-land adventure today? Try the hike up to the summit of Mount Maunga Pu; at 407 feet, it's the highest spot on this lowslung atoll.

AT SEA (2 DAYS) With the Cook Islands astern and Tonga ahead, enjoy the superb unplugged beauty of a two-day sail through the South Pacific—and across the International Date Line, a waypoint few travelers can say they've visited. The Gauguin's onboard troupe of Tahitian cultural gurus will be on hand, retelling Polynesian legends through dance and song, providing hands-on craft and fashion demonstrations, and radiating the irresistible warmth of the region.

VAVA'U The Kingdom of Tonga, Polynesia's sole modern-day monarchy, has never been colonized by a foreign power. Among the proud archipelago's 170 atolls, the Vava'u island group is a favored haven for pleasure yachts and unique culture/cuisine seekers. Thanks to the exceptional water clarity, an undersea wonderland thrives here too. Visiting snorkelers are liable to see spinner dolphins, manta rays, sea turtles, giant clams, and countless tropical fish species enjoying these lush coral gardens.

Those curious to witness a far different Tongan landscape should consider a Swallow Cave and Island Getaway, whisking you by boat to Kapa Island and a remarkable cave that is not, as its name implies, inhabited by swallows.

Instead, hundreds of tiny, acrobatic swiftlets flit about in the dim light, nesting in the darkness of the grotto's upper reaches. Your outing settles back down to Earth for some R&R along exquisite Falevai Mui Houma Beach.

Rather climb a mountain? Head for Mount Talau National Park and an easy hike to the summit. Elevation may only be 331 feet, but the views go on forever.

AT SEA Another leisurely day at sea, another chance to learn more about the culture of the islands with onboard lectures and presentations. For instance: the classic Polynesian dress for women, the pareo (or sarong), originated in Tahiti and the Cook Islands. Often brilliantly decorated with hibiscus flowers, indigenous designs, or traditional tapa patterns, pareos are today sported by both men and women. Master some of the many ways to tie and wear them with guidance from Les Gauguines.

SAVUSAVU Meet the island of Vanua Levu, home to the spectacular Hibiscus Highway, Nakawaga waterfall, edible bêche-de-mer sea cucumbers, and enough soft corals to impress even Jean-Michel Cousteau. Unassuming and unspoiled, this second largest of Fiji's 300 isles is anchored by Savusavu, a town once known only to coconut oil traders. Today, it's your port of entry to adventure.

Trek among exotic palms, virgin hardwoods, and colorful parrots on a Waisali Rain Forest & Reserve excursion. Witness the elders of an authentic Fijian parish as they practice their unforgettable kava ceremony during the Nukubalavu Village Tour. Take a Snorkeling Tour into crystal clear Savusavu Bay, brimming with plate and soft corals, sea turtles, friendly reef sharks, and fish, fish, fish.

SUVA Arrayed on a hilly peninsula between twin harbors on Viti Levu island, Fiji's capital city sports an eclectic mix of modern and colonial

architecture, showcasing all the touchpoints of Fijian culture from historical museums to handicraft markets. An inviting place to explore on foot freestyle, Suva and its surrounds will also satisfy your most diverse excursion cravings whether they run to volcano hikes, WWII heritage sites, high canopy ziplining, waterfall swims, botanical garden tours, or playdays along a resort beach.

BEQA ISLAND First of all: it's pronounced "BENG-uh" despite the spelling. Second, it's a tiny Eden—less than six square miles—with a huge heart and a friendly disposition. No paved roads and just a sprinkling of villages. The barrier reef within its startlingly turquoise lagoon, once the crater of an ancient volcano, is now a world-class draw for divers, snorkelers, and fishing enthusiasts.

Waterfalls tumble, golden beaches sparkle, forests of papaya and coconut ripen, and gentle breezes whisper the secrets of a paradise steeped in traditions, where the 500-year-old ritual of Fijian firewalking was born—and is still practiced. Witness one on an excursion during your visit, and you might never want to go barefoot again.

LAUTOKA Set on the opposite coast of Viti Levu from Suva, Lautoka is an ex-British enclave with one foot in Polynesia and the other squarely in Melanesia. Vast fields of golden-green sugarcane surround the city on three sides; the fourth side is all deep-blue Pacific.

Stroll the shops along palm-lined Vitigo Parade or the sugar-fine white sand of beaches shaded by coconut palms. Further afield, hike the rainforest trails in Koroyanitu National Heritage Park or catch the scent of over 2,000 rare orchids growing among manicured lawns and lily ponds in the Garden of the Sleeping Giant. A fitting end (or beginning) for this idyllic voyage.

What could be more lovely than moisturizing with perfumed oil? Using the French perfume making technique of enfleurage, monoi oil is crafted by infusing hand-picked tiaré flowers with locally pressed coconut oil. The tiaré flower, also known as the Tahitian gardenia, is the national flower and the fragrance ambassador of the Society Islands. Tahitians know that using this nurturing oil is the perfect way to extend the polished glow of sun kissed skin.

If you plan on bringing back one precious memento from your Polynesian holiday, it should be a Tahitian pearl! Available in a wide range of hues, most Tahitian pearls are actually charcoal, silver, or dark green. You'll find these luminous gems at markets throughout the Society Islands and in specialty stores in Moorea and Papeete. Using the more exotic colors of pistachio, peacock, emerald, rose, and blue, Hinerava, one of Tahiti's leading jewelers, offers their collection onboard the ship.

> When you visit Taha'a, close your eyes and inhale the scent of vanilla as it lingers like perfume in the air. Vanilla farms dot this island, and French Polynesia exports 25 tons of 'black gold' annually. Traditionally used to flavor desserts, Tahitian vanilla takes on a savory role, when it is used onboard the ship, in the popular dish-Lobster with Vanilla Sauce. Vanilla can be found throughout the islands, but especially on Taha'a and in the markets in Papeete.

Ancient Polynesians recorded their history and honored their ancestors by creating

#### woodcarvings.

Collectors have prized them for centuries. Pablo Picasso even kept a Marquesan tiki in his studio as a source of creative inspiration. Woodcarvings remain a


vibrant art form central to Polynesian culture and many people still enjoy collecting them today. Tikis top the collectible list, so look for these sacred icons on the Marquesas Islands and in the shops and market in Papeete.



#### The sounds of your first names already take us on a journey... What do they mean?

Hinanui Ina: I'm originally from Tahiti. In Polynesian beliefs, Hina is the name of the Moon goddess. And nui means 'great'. So Hinanui, 'the great Hina.'

Mihimana: I'm also Tahitian and my name means 'the power of thought.'

#### Who are the Gauguines and Gauguins?

Hinanui Ina: We are dancers, musicians and singers. As well as welcoming guests, our 'mission' is to take them to the heart of Polynesia, our culture and traditionsof which we have a great knowledge, much more than the mere 'postcard.' With us, both on board and ashore, they learn the basics of Tahitian dance and a few rudiments of our language. They learn the secrets of weaving to make wreaths, baskets and hats. Guests are also very curious about our tattoos and their meanings.

#### Which facet of Polynesian culture do you think most fascinates the guests?

Hinanui Ina: What most fascinates those who come to see us is our way of life, I think. Our simplicity, our kindness. Mihimana: We never forget that, for some guests, this may be the trip of a lifetime. So it's our duty to make this a moment they will never forget. 'Receiving' is part of our education. 'Being Tahitian' means being friendly, smiling and always ready to help others. Wherever they go, in whatever country, Tahitians greet others. Living on a small island where everyone knows everyone else fosters solidarity and a sense of community.


#### 'Being Tahitian' also means living in harmony with the ocean...

Mihimana: Some families perpetuate this deep bond across the generations by tattooing on their bodies the marine animal that symbolises them, protects

them and tells their story: a shark, a dolphin, a turtle... It is also said that when a Polynesian dies, their soul returns to the ocean. When someone dies, we take to the sea in pirogues or on surfboards. We sing and throw a wreath of flowers into the sea in tribute to the deceased. These are very strong traditions here.

#### What is the nicest thing anyone has said to you at the end of a trip?

Hinanui Ina: "We'll be back." And the guests return. At the end of each cruise, we usually sing a Polynesian song. It's not unusual to see a few tears fall. It's always a very emotional moment, both for the guests and for us.
