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We've been on board for seven nights of our 10-night itinerary and experience two opposing sensations simultaneously: the first is feeling completely at home on this ship; the second is the wonder of experiencing things we've only viewed in photographs.









Everything has been set up for us in a way that defines what a luxury small ship has to offer. Our stateroom is furnished with every amenity—queen bed, attractive furniture, and, best of all, a balcony that immerses us in the Polynesian air. It's an elixir for our senses. The ship retains the feel of a luxury yacht because there is mahogany woodwork everywhere, the kind of craftsmanship not found these days. Evocative, historic photos of the islands line the hallways. Feeling like we are on a ship rather than sailing in what could be mistaken for a modern airport lounge, is important to us.

As opposed to other more formal cruises, the atmosphere is blissfully carefree and casual. This encompasses not only the dress code—flip flops are allowed everywhere except for two of the three dining

rooms at dinner—but the banter and comfort level the guests have with the crew. Many have worked for Paul Gauguin Cruises for more than a decade, and their genuinely friendly hospitality enhances the notion that French Polynesia is a relaxed, welcoming place. Especially helpful are the onboard excursion directors; all are Polynesian and have lived on the islands we visited. They readily provide inside info on what to see and do.

As we approach Bora Bora, the captain invites us to the bridge to help us understand the navigational challenges of this reef-ringed atoll. The brilliantly blue waters surrounding the islands are calm because each is protected by a treacherous ring of coral, usually with one or two small openings. Because *The Gauguin* is a purpose-built ship for just these waters, its shallow

draft allows us to follow the local boats into and tuck ourselves into smaller anchorages unavailable to most cruise ships. Once there, we sleep in the shadow of the majestic, impenetrable, verdant mountains.

We weren't expecting to reap so much enjoyment during the languid days at sea, which regularly afford sunrises and sunsets that defy the imagination. We are lulled by the rhythms of the waves against the bow, the seabirds, and the changing patterns of light, all enjoyed under the bluest of skies.

Sea days are punctuated by seminars from naturalists, both marine and geologic, all held in a spacious theater. Additionally, there are eight cultural ambassadors—Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins—warm and welcoming islanders who live aboard to inform, entertain, and teach classes in the local language, crafts, and dance. These young people, full of infectious enthusiasm for their culture, bring the *mana* (spiritual essence, or life force) of Polynesia to life. Their culture feels intact. Women wear hair flowers—not just for a tourist photo-op. Flowing, floral-printed *pareos* are seen everywhere, and guests learn traditional dances.»

With three restaurants, each a different vibe and menu, we decide nightly if we want to be more formal and dine at La Veranda and L'Etoile, or more casual at Le Grill with its delightful ocean breezes.

Since all food (everything from vegan to steak) and a nice selection of quality wines are inclusive, we find it hard to discipline ourselves. And, for those who get peckish mid-afternoon, there are sandwiches and such a variety of unique desserts that we take a few for after dinner.

A culinary high point is watching the chef discuss and then filet an enormous, just-caught, 100+ pound moon fish many of us would enjoy that night for dinner.

Our fellow travelers exhibit a welcoming camaraderie, and it only takes a few days to find those who will become dear friends. It happens in the nicest way. Because one of the daily joys of cruising in Tahiti is watching the dream-like sunrise, we start each morning on the upper deck with our La Palette cappuccinos. Another couple is always there. Once we start talking, we learn how compatible we are. A year later, we've seen them a few times in New York City (our hometown) and expect we will stay in touch. We also meet people who were fun to hang out with during our cruise even though we may never see them again.

Our favorite excursion is Bora Bora's Coral Garden, and not just because we love our knowledgeable, funny, and re-assuring guide.

During a single snorkel we see 20 eagle rays relaxing on the lagoon bottom, a manta ray with a 12-foot wingspan receiving her daily cleaning by wrasse fish, and the most remarkable sight of all, a "garden" with such diversely shaped, textured, sized, and colored assortment of coral that all of us on the swim agree—this is more than enough reason to have traveled thousands of miles.

Add to this the seemingly hundreds of fish species that inhabit the reef, and we are treated to one of nature's unforgettable sights. Our guide gives us a piece of banana, which the fish nibble in tiny pecks. Plus, the water is a perfect temperature; the transition of our bodies from air to water and eventually back out again is seamless. Fantastic!

Another memorable experience is standing waist deep in gin-clear waters while blacktip sharks and giant rays gently circle us. Sounds scary but it absolutely isn't. Magical is a better word. These extensive reefs help us understand that Polynesia is a full-spectrum experience... from cloud-shrouded mountain peaks, to valleys so verdant they seem prehistoric, and this underwater paradise.

Taha'a is home to *The Gauguin*'s private islet—Motu Mahana—where we learn local games, swim, enjoy a barbeque, and watch the passing clouds change the color of the water. Spending hours on our own island, bathed by tropical breezes and sipping cocktails from coconuts is a true slice of paradise.

A final realization: We take for granted we will fall asleep off one island and wake up near another, something that can only happen on a cruise ship. We've traveled on our own nearly everywhere but, while touring a mainland, a car or train will get you where you want to be. It's not the same here in the South Pacific. Ferries and flights are sporadic. Several islands have inadequate accommodations. Some of the distances are great. By removing all the stresses of coordinating planes, ferries, and automobiles, we are free to luxuriate in our ship's many amenities and contemplate our surroundings. Now that's luxury in paradise.



EPILOGUE: We stayed on our own on Moorea for a few days after the cruise ended. We thought it would be great to be on one of the stunning places we had seen from the ship. Much to our surprise, that wasn't the case. Breezes in our waterfront cottage were blocked by the mountain behind us. On *The Gauguin*, it was always breezy. Plus, while the view from sea level was nice, it lacked the magic we had come to expect at sea. We learned that on land, you only see the ocean. From a ship, you see and feel both.

CULTURE CORNER:

The Living Language of Tahiti

The Tahitian language, Reo Tahiti, is more than words—it is rhythm, song, and the living spirit of the islands. To speak it, even in greeting, is to carry a little of French Polynesia in your voice.

Language is one of the most profound ways to connect with a place. In Tahiti, words seem to flow with a natural cadence, each syllable carrying a sense of harmony with the islands themselves. Known as Reo Tahiti, the Tahitian language belongs to the vast Polynesian family that stretches across the Pacific, linking cultures from Hawai'i to New Zealand.

For centuries, Tahitians passed down stories, songs, and genealogy through oral tradition. The language is rich in vowels and fluid sounds, lending it a lyrical quality that feels inseparable from the

rhythms of daily island life. In some rural and outer-island communities, Tahitian continues to serve as a principal language helping preserve ancestral ties across generations.

French is the official language of French Polynesia, widely used in government, schools, and media. Tahitian, however, is a cornerstone of cultural identity and is taught in schools, sung in church choirs, and spoken with pride in families and communities. English, meanwhile, is common in tourism and hospitality, giving most islanders a trilingual fluency that reflects the Polynesian openness to the wider world.

To visitors, even a few simple Tahitian words open doors. A warm la Orana (hello) is not merely a greeting—it is an embrace of welcome. Saying Maururu (thank you) or Manuia! (cheers!) invites a smile and recognition that you are part of the rhythm here, not apart from it.

Tahitian words also carry cultural and spiritual depth. Mana describes the sacred energy believed to inhabit all living things. Moana means ocean, the eternal pathway connecting every island, while Motu refers to the sandy islets that ring turquoise lagoons.

For travelers, learning a few essential phrases adds delight to every encounter:

Hello... *Ia* **Orana** (yo-rah-nah)

See you later... *Nana* (nah-nah)

Welcome... Maeva (mah-yeh-vah)

Thank you... *Maururu* (mah-roo-roo)

Cheers... *Manuia* (mah-nwee-ah)

Beer... Pia (pee-ah)

Yes... E (ay)

No... Aita (eye-tah)

I love you... Uua here vau ia oe

(oo-ah hay-ray ee-ah oh-ay)

Which way to the bathroom? E hea te vahi no te fare tahe?

(Eh hee-ah teh vah-hee no teh fah-reh tah-heh?)

How much does this cost? E hia te moni?

(Eh hee-ah teh moh-nee?)

The meal is very good! E rave rahi maita'i ïa ïa'ai 'ohipa

(Eh rah-veh rah-hee mee-tah-ee ee-ah ee-ah-ah-ee oh-hee-pah)

Each word is an invitation, each phrase a thread woven into the living tapestry of Polynesia. To speak Tahitian, even briefly, is to honor the voice of the islands themselves.

Tahiti & the Society Islands

The 118 islands and atolls of French Polynesia shimmer like a string of prized Tahitian pearls. Tahiti and the Society Islands have inspired generations of artists and writers seeking to capture their magical allure. Among countless others, Herman Melville, James A. Michener, Henri Matisse—and, of course, Paul Gauguin himself—were transfixed by these islands. You will be, too.

Visiting five destinations in seven nights, the m/s Paul Gauguin will bring you closer to Tahiti, Huahine, Taha'a, Bora Bora, and Moorea for an intimate experience not possible on larger ships. Each island will charm you in a different way. Onboard views astound the senses and set the pulse racing; each island beckons with Edenic beauty. This is the proverbial adventure of a lifetime.



TAHITI The islands of French Polynesia are a spectacular collection of volcanic atolls strewn across the tranguil Pacific Ocean, and the island of Tahiti is the largest of them all. Called the "Queen of the Pacific," the royal moniker is appropriate, and you'll see why. Majestic, stately, and steeped in history, the island is synonymous with paradise.

While you're likely eager to board your new floating home-away-from-home, don't cheat yourself from sampling the bounty that Tahiti offers on land, first. As The Gauguin waits in the harbor, the capital city of Papeete offers shopping, waterfront dining, entertainment, and swoon-inducing sunsets. If you run out of time to see all you want to see, don't worry—you'll return back to Papeete after your sea journey is complete.

HUAHINE How about breakfast in bed? You'll need energy for the day, and really, being pampered right from the start sets a nice precedent for the discovery ahead.

In the brilliant morning light, a palette of blues and greens greets you as The Gauguin reaches her first port. The excitement is palpable as guests gather on deck to snap pictures, lost in absolute wonder.

Lush rainforests, dramatic landscapes, and idyllic lagoons welcome you to Huahine, one of French Polynesia's best-kept secrets. Hidden temples embellished with rare orchids, romantic enclaves, and untouched hideaways await at every turn. One of the most secluded of the Society Islands. Huahine takes its name from the Tahitian word vahine (woman), perhaps because the island's most prominent mountain ridge resembles the silhouette of a pregnant lady.

The pace here is relaxed. Tranquility floats in the air. Serenity surrounds you like an embrace. The splendor of the landscape playfully wrestles with the kaleidoscopic wonderland just beneath the surface of crystal waters. Let your own desires shape your day: Wander the village, take in the spectacular views, and lounge on the beach.

TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Life is simple on this flower-shaped island, orchids and hibiscus grace the landscape and the air is sweet with vanilla. Most of the Tahitian vanilla prized by gourmets comes from Taha'a, so you'll want to stock up during your visit. With only a handful of guest houses and small hotels, this sleepy island is authentically Polynesian-

the vibe is so laid-back you'll marvel that you ever worried about things like deadlines, schedules, and meetings. Off-the-charts snorkeling and diving are a given. Pillowy mountains, fertile valleys, and sparkling beaches will vie for your exploration, whether it's visiting a vanilla plantation, hiking ancient trails, or exploring the lush jungle on a guided 4x4 trek.

Nestled within Taha'a's tranquil lagoon is Motu Mahana, The Gauguin's own private islet. No other cruise ship can access this intimate corner of paradise, and your exclusive day here will be one of serene relaxation. The experience is truly Tahitian. Les Gauguines welcome you with authentic Polynesian music, and then your time is your own. Leave your watch in your stateroom, because on Motu Mahana there are no schedules, no deadlines, and definitely no stress. Doze on a chaise lounge under a blue-sky canopy. Grab your favorite libation from the floating bar and find a perfect spot to enjoy. Join in a game of beach volleyball, take to the water on a kayak, or explore the underwater wonders with complimentary snorkel equipment. When you've worked up an appetite, a beach barbecue awaits. This is life in paradise.



BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT)

On Bora Bora, you're inside the postcard looking out. With the castle-like centerpiece of Mount Otemanu soaring skyward, the "Romantic Island" offers a decadent display of endless azure skies, turquoise waters, and Technicolor wildlife on land, sea, and air. Tuck a hibiscus flower behind your ear and surrender to the fragrant breezes of one of the world's top honeymoon destinations.

After indulging in the enchantment of your own private isle on Motu Mahana, your visit to Bora Bora rewards with yet another exclusive beach experience. Bring a towel from the ship and find your own spot on these private shores to bask in the warmth of the South Pacific sunshine and swim in the crystal-clear waters. While you can easily spend a day simply wandering the beaches being mesmerized by the lagoon's legendary blue waters, more active pursuits beckon inland, either on a 4x4 excursion or a scenic journey by Le Truck, an authentic Polynesian mode of transport.

One of the most unforgettable experiences you'll find in the South Pacific is the opportunity to stand in shallow waters as playful (and harmless) stingrays swim

their ballet-like dance around you. The rays are accustomed to visitors and gently glide around as your guide feeds them. Keep your eyes open for possible sightings of lemon sharks, blacktip reef sharks, and schools of colorful fish. The story of your Sharks & Stingrays Encounter will inspire awe every time you tell it.

MOOREA (OVERNIGHT) It's okay to stare in wide-eyed amazement; Moorea is used to it. This island is everything you imagine a South Pacific island would be: majestic and mysterious, alluring and hypnotic. Waterfalls tumble from volcanic ridges as ferns dance in the spray. The lush landscape bursts with coffee, sugarcane, and pineapple. Warm waters beckon with open arms. If heaven exists on Earth, it must be here.

In this setting, you may need to express yourself with something other than words. Let your inner artist out to paint, sketch, doodle—even photograph Moorea's epic vistas or something on a smaller scale. There is endless beauty here to inspire you.

In addition to creative pursuits, Moorea is a wonderland for active travelers. How will you get your adrenaline pumping during your two days here? SCUBA

excursions, snorkeling adventures, paddleboarding, kayaking, and wave runners await - and many of these activities can be launched from the ship's watersports marina. You can also go off the beaten path on an Aito Off-Road Safari excursion. This four-hour adventure explores the volcanic crater from which Moorea was born via an off-road vehicle, with plenty of time included to stop for local treats like homemade jam, ice cream, and fresh fruit juice.

PAPEETE, TAHITI Your overnight stay in Papeete gives you the opportunity to sample the city's nightlife. Take the short walk to the park across from the harbor, Vai'ete Square, where more than 30 food trucks, called Les Roulottes, serve up fresh, inexpensive, and very good food—everything from Chinese to French to the local catch of the day. In Papeete, many stores are open in the evening, giving you a last chance to collect a special memento or treasured bauble... maybe even some Tahitian pearls.

All too soon, the sunrise comes and with it, the conclusion of your cruise experience. The best news is The Gauguin considers you family and eagerly awaits your return.



The Incredible Memories

[WE WEREN'T EVEN EXPECTING]

partnership between Paul Gauguin Cruises and Tahiti-based marine education and conservation foundation Te mana o te moana, the MEP flips the script of a typical kids' club. While I studied the excursion brochure to maximize my time on each island, my girls had a full week planned: afternoons of beach games on Bora Bora and snorkeling on Huahine, an evening stargazing session, and movie night.

After their first day with the MEP, my daughters told me about the long-snouted trumpetfish and slithering shy eels they saw lurking in rainbows of coral. A few months back, I had tried and failed to teach them to snorkel over the course of a week; it took the MEP five minutes. Naturalists Mai and Doris taught my children both the things they wouldn't listen to me about (snorkeling) and the things they shouldn't listen to me about (marine life). The girls spent dinners spouting sea turtle facts and describing black-tipped sharks, information they put to use when we swam with those very animals later that week. Though they never wanted to miss a single session, the program's flexibility—and the ship's new connecting rooms—make for an ideal multi-generational trip, giving families both the time they need together and the space they need apart.

They enjoyed Tahiti's glassy blue water and soul-warming sunshine, but The Gauguin and its MEP gave my curious kids a connection below the surface. Interacting with Polynesian people, places, and creatures gave them the opportunity to ask experts and learn more about what intrigued them.

I started the trip worried that the girls' only takeaways would be sunburns and sugar highs, instead they came home laden with shell bracelets, heads full of plans to protect the ocean, and an insatiable desire to return to French Polynesia as soon as possible.

Playing games about marine pollution sounds like a metaphor for uselessness, but the program's naturalists expertly use the activities to encourage Moana Explorers ages six to 15 to not just fall in love with nature, but also to understand its fragility—and that we, as people, have the responsibility to do something about it.

They just happen to do that by entertaining kids in the natural playground of French Polynesia, leading them on underwater adventures through the majestic universe of brightly colored fish and graceful sea turtles.








From Bora Bora, Moorea, and Taha'a to Huahine and a return to Raiatea, these destinations are sure to captivate you too, just as they did Melville, Stevenson, and Gauguin himself.

Set your heart aglow and immerse your senses with the jaw-dropping views painted in dreamlike colors. This is the adventure you will never forget.



TAHITI You'll embark your cruise on French Polynesia's largest island—Tahiti. Located halfway between Los Angeles and Sydney, Tahiti is comprised of two ancient volcanic cones: Tahiti Nui in the northwest and Tahiti Iti on the southeastern peninsula.

Your journey begins in the vibrant capital city of Papeete on Tahiti Nui where you can explore markets, museums, and galleries. And awaiting in the harbor: the m/s Paul Gauguin.

Following a warm welcome aboard, you'll settle into your stateroom or suite to unpack, settle in, and familiarize yourself with your beautifully appointed home upon the sea for the next seven days.

Sleep well. You've got quite a day tomorrow.

HUAHINE Lush and untamed—indeed, a veritable Garden of Eden—Huahine is one of Tahiti's best-kept secrets...but don't worry, your crew aboard *The Gauguin* knows where all the treasures are hidden

and they're eager to introduce you to this picturesque destination.

A morning arrival welcomes you with exquisite light gracing the translucent turquoise lagoons perfect for a snorkel or swim. Nestled within the dense landscape of tropical forest, vanilla orchards, and towering coconut palms are well-preserved archaeological sites and sacred temples entwined in jungle vines. The delicate scents of frangipani and *tiare* (Tahiti's renowned gardenia flower) elevate the senses and tranquility lingers in the air. Huahine is truly Polynesian: the pace is a bit slower than that of her sister isles, but the magnificent beauty is equally as compelling.

The four-hour **Sacred Sites & Legendary Places** excursion showcases important historical relics, as well as some of the island's most beautiful panoramas. Alternatively, you might choose to be whisked to Motu Murimahora for some incredible snorkeling followed by a

secluded beach picnic. You'll have plenty of time to let your cares drift away on the caress of the island breeze on this **Motu Picnic** adventure.

RAIATEA Blanketed in a lush landscape dotted with waterfalls, fertile valleys, and the cloud-capped Mount Temehani, Raiatea is Polynesia's most sacred island. It was from here that the earliest migrations set forth to settle in Hawaii, New Zealand, and beyond. The island boasts a rich Maohi history and is home to the UNESCO-listed Marae Taputapuatea archaeological site. Located just northwest of Tahiti, "The Pearl of the Pacific" is surrounded by motus and embraced by a coral reef—which means off-the-charts snorkeling. With the iconic Mount Otemanu in view, bask in the sun, kayak, or paddleboard from Paul Gauguin Cruises' exclusive beach. Whether you seek high adventure or supreme tranquility, the vibe here is friendly and relaxed. Smiles come easily and gentle breezes whisper, "Stay a while. And promise to come back." This really is heaven on Earth.



Key among the highlights is an overnight in Fakarava, home to a submarine ecosystem so unique it's designated a UNESCO-listed Biosphere Reserve. Add to that an overnight bathed in the legendary allure of Bora Bora, relaxed days to explore Moorea's emerald mountains, ancient Raiatea and lush Huahine, and the incomparable subsurface beauty of Rangiroa's world-famous natural "aquarium"—and you've got a journey rich in beauty, exploration, adventure, and luxury. On the ship, on the land, and beneath the waves.



TAHITI Boarding The Gauguin before her sunset departure from Papeete, enjoy a classically warm Tahitian welcome from staff and crew—and your first glimpses of the epic beauty that so defines the Society Islands. You'll likely be snapping photos excitedly already, but no camera—or even Photoshop filter—can quite capture it. You must see it with your own eyes to believe it. As you will be doing repeatedly in the string of days to come.

AT SEA As you glide toward the Tuamotus, an urgent call comes in. It's *The Gauguin*'s mahogany-framed saltwater pool, requesting your presence for a delightful swim, lounging with newfound friends, a bit of food, perhaps a cocktail.

Sea days are perfect for that sort of thing. And for visits to the Algotherm Spa. And for expanding your skills with Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins, your onboard hosts ever at the ready to provide lessons in Tahitian dance, *pareo*-tying, and traditional crafts. There's also no bigger wow than the one you get from a deckside sunset at sea.

FAKARAVA (OVERNIGHT) An

afternoon arrival here brings you to one of UNESCO's seven Biosphere Reserves for the preservation of rare species. Luring divers from all over the world, Fakarava's sprawling lagoon and reef provide a home and underwater nursery for precious marine fauna found nowhere else. Whether you opt for a 90-minute Fakarava Pinnacle Snorkel excursion or a full-day Tour of South Pass & Tetamanu, you'll experience some of Mother Nature's finest subsurface handiwork.

Of course, as with the rest of the South Pacific, adventure ashore here proves just as tempting. Perhaps a relaxed e-bike spin through a verdant coconut grove situated on the coast? The pyramidal Topaka lighthouse along the route is among the oldest in Polynesia, and the handsome coral church on Fakarava's southern tip has weathered the test of time and tropics since the 1870s.

With two days to explore this "Island of Dreams," you'll soon understand how it earned its name.

RANGIROA Picture a crystal-blue lagoon so vast the entire island of Tahiti could fit within it, encircled by 240 palmy sand islets and parked above one of the planet's most vibrant coral reef systems. If Rangiroa wasn't already on your bucket list, you'll soon be correcting the omission.

Experience the drift-snorkel of your dreams on a **Snorkeling Rangiroa's Aquarium** excursion, as a fluorescent menagerie of undersea life awaits your visit to their coral gardens on Motu Nui Nui, one of Rangiroa's most famous spots. Located at the entrance of the Tiputa Pass, here you'll swim among rays and dolphins and fish of every size, shape, and color.

Bask Crusoe-style on a pink-sand beach or cavort in a Reef Island swim hole. Visit a Blue Lagoon in a blue lagoon. Spot Tuamotu sandpipers at a seabird sanctuary. Catch wild dolphins leaping at Tiputa Point, or watch parrot fish, black-tip sharks, and huge Napoleon wrasse swim by beneath your dry feet on a **Glass-bottom Boat Tour** over Tiputa Channel.



More into landlubbing? Wander picturesque Avatoru village or venture a bit farther down the road to the vineyard responsible for French Polynesia's only wine label, Vin de Tahiti.

HUAHINE A fresh day brings the promise of lush discoveries here on "The Garden Island." Everywhere your eye lands is deep, verdant green—or a thousand shades of shimmering blue. Life is quiet here; the jungle holds its secrets close, hinting at their richness with the sounds and scents of paradise. Huahine was once the playground of Tahitian royalty; today it's yours. The island's historical allure is the stuff of legends, with maraes (temples), monuments, and archaeological relics dating back to the birth of the Polynesian culture. The Gauguin's anthropologist-led Sacred Sites & Legendary Places excursion visits Maeva, where many of these are concentrated, as well as a working vanilla plantation and a village where you'll meet—and feed—the famous blue-eyed eels of Faie.

BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT) The

name alone triggers runaway romantic notions. But oh, what passion the reality of two days in Bora Bora will inspire. It's no wonder this jewel-like island with its slice-of-heaven lagoon is such a go-to for weddings, honeymoons, vow renewals and spontaneous declarations of love. Your days here can be casual, barefoot, unhurried. Especially at The Gauguin's exclusive beach retreat where time and cares evaporate in the Polynesian breeze. Snorkel, sunbathe, paddleboard, or simply float about in water so turquoise

it appears on no color chart on Earth. Quench your hunger and thirst with cool drinks from a floating bar and a barbeque lunch served as al fresco as they come. Bring active adventure into the equation with excursions like a Sharks & Stingray Encounter, or a Bora Bora Off-Road Adventure that ascends the steep hills to jaw-dropping overlooks. Maybe even take to the lagoon for an adrenaline-fueled Circle Island by Waverunner. No matter how splendid you've imagined this South Seas paradise to be, it's all that and more.

RAIATEA Polynesia's most mythic island is a contender for most scenic, too, with its landscape dotted with ginger plants and waterfalls and its skyline defined by misty Mount Temehani. It was from these turquoise shores that the ancient Maohi launched their double-hulled sailing canoes to settle in Hawaii, New Zealand, and beyond. Perhaps you'll launch your own craft today, and kayak the Faaroa River. Or enjoy a drift-snorkel in Raiatea's crystalline lagoon, shared with neighboring Taha'a. You might explore Raiatea's top viewpoints by open-air safari truck, or visit the UNESCO-listed Marae Taputapuatea archaeological complex and sense the 1,000-year-old spirit of this isle whose name translates to "faraway heaven."

TAHA'A | MOTU MAHANA |

Foremost on today's agenda: vanquish any troubles, deadlines, or responsibilities with a Motu Mahana beach day. Paul Gauguin Cruises' private Polynesian islet offers sun, swaying palms, thatched huts, amiable chatter, and plenty of ukulele. Stroll the soft

sand motu barefoot. Queue up your entrant in a spirited sandcrab race or toss up your serve in a boisterous beach volleyball game. Elsewhere on Taha'a, alternate adventures await. Quaint villages perfect for browsing. Island lanes perfect for cycling. Ancient hiking trails and 4x4 treks into mountain jungle. And everywhere, the intoxicating scent of paradise.

MOOREA Heart-shaped Moorea seems designed for celebrating love. Its eight craggy volcanic peaks tower over twin lagoons. Waterfalls and fern carpets cascade down the hillsides while coffee, sugarcane, and pineapples ripen in the valleys. Sparkling waist-deep water blankets the shorelines. And spinner dolphins leap acrobatically among the waves. Don't bother trying to resist this allure; it's not possible. Instead, surrender to the myriad possibilities: Ascend to the isle's ancient crater on an Aito Off-Road Safari. Experience a subsurface stroll along the lagoon floor with reef fish and rays for company on an Aquablue Underwater Walk. Explore by e-bike, waverunner, small plane, catamaran, mountain trail, or ATV. When it's time to sail onward, hug yourself and those around you. It's the Moorean way.

PAPEETE, TAHITI

(OVERNIGHT) Alas, like all life's finest journeys, your m/s Paul Gauguin voyage must end. Enriched, relaxed, and with a very fond adieu to the many staff and new friends you've gotten to know, you'll disembark this morning. But perhaps only for a while. Tahiti and her sister islands cast a spell not easily broken.

longside the spectacular scenery, fascinating excursions, and unforgettable experiences, it was a joy every time we reboarded the ship to head to one of the three restaurants to enjoy the French-inspired Tahitian fare.

Our balcony stateroom was on the same deck as the reservation-only La Veranda at the stern. One deck directly below it was the dining room L'Etoile, with its daily changing menu. Just two decks above us was the sun deck and third restaurant, Le Grill, which spills out onto the pool area from under its covers on mild evenings.

The gourmet cuisine in all three restaurants was extraordinarily good—and a bonus that all the food and drink (even Champagne) was included in the fare, though you can choose to pay from the Connoisseur Wine List if you wish to sip the likes of Veuve Clicquot, Dom Perignon, and Louis Roederer Cristal.

My wife Mandy and I enjoy meeting new friends but were pleased that we were able to have a table for two every night.»



Each day began with breakfast on the open deck, with smiling waiters carrying our dishes to the table. During time on board we might enjoy canapés in our stateroom or even the 24-hour room service, biding the time till lunch or ti no avatea (afternoon tea) served in La Veranda.

But it was the evenings we looked forward to most, knowing every dish would be a feast for the eyes as well as the taste buds.


There's a theatricality about good food—one day a giant moonfish was carved with expert precision on the pool deck, ready to be served in the evening at L'Etoile and Le Grill. For the colorful Polynesian night, lobster tail and grilled wahoo were on the menu.

As for the drinking venues, our favorite was the Piano Bar, though on fine days the Pool Bar beckoned on the open deck. The cozy La Palette lounge served a late riser's breakfast and afternoon tea, as well as evening cocktails.

One morning we took a tender boat to the line's private islet— Motu Mahana—for a beachside Polynesian barbecue of sizzling skewers, steaks, burgers, hot dogs, and chicken as well as salads and fruit.

Looking back on my memorable voyage, I realize I was expecting the beautiful islands and dazzling seas. What surprised and delighted me was the sheer quality of the food on board.

Since I cruised on Paul Gauguin Cruises, the ship has been refurbished, including a contemporary redesign of the Le Grill. Guess I'll just have to go back again, sometime...

L'Etoile

Highlights: Kalua pork quesadillas, cucumber and daikon, Caesar salad and wonton soup. Main courses of grilled local fresh fish, Polynesian lemon chicken, marinated grilled veal sirloin, and mixed vegetable tempura.





Beyond Bora Bora's famed lagoon and legendary beauty, or Moorea's stunning mountain peaks and palm-fringed beaches—both enjoyed on overnight stays (with a double overnight in Bora Bora)—this voyage entices with undersea adventures in the Tuamotus, including coveted diving and snorkeling in Rangiroa and rare discovery within Fakarava's renowned UNESCO-listed Biosphere Reserve. Explore Huahine's lush garden beauty and enjoy a day on our own private islet, Motu Mahana.



TAHITI Welcome aboard the m/s Paul Gauguin! You are on the cusp of an extraordinary journey that will take you to dreamy places that have long lingered in your mind's eye.

You've seen photos of Tahiti and wondered what kind of filters or Photoshop magic have made the colors so intense. Your first task is to suspend disbelief. You're here. What you're seeing is real, and this is just the beginning.

HUAHINE Daybreak brings you to "The Garden Island" for a morning of exploration. Where will your curiosity lead you in this veritable Garden of Eden? Temptations (the good kind) abound. Once the playground for Tahitian royalty, you find yourself in the very cradle of Tahitian culture. Temples, monuments, and archaeological relics dating as far back as 700B.c. have waited thousands of years for your arrival.

Everywhere your eye lands is lovely and a deep, verdant green. Life is quiet here; the jungle greets you with sights, sounds, and scents you will only experience in the

South Pacific. In the distance, the islands of Raiatea, Taha'a, and Bora Bora welcome you to the neighborhood.

An array of island excursions is yours to consider. From diving and snorkeling, a motu picnic or a lagoon cruise, the choice is yours. Explore the island in an offroad 4x4 on the guided Huahine Safari **Expedition** to visit the village Faie and its famed blue-eyed eels. Then board an outrigger canoe to reach Huahine Pearl Farm & Pottery in the middle of the lagoon. Learn secrets of the black pearl and consider taking some of their famous blue pottery home with you. Back on the island, enjoy a drive along Lake Fauna Nui.

BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT)

Spread out in a lavish opulence of colors and textures is one of the world's most famous destinations for romance: Bora Bora. It's easy to understand why this island is the site of so many weddings, honeymoons, vow renewals, and spontaneous declarations of love. The unparalleled beauty of this setting has inspired passion for thousands of years.

Have your camera ready; with its lush mountains, white sand beaches, and dreamy lagoons, Bora Bora just begs to have its picture taken. You can't miss the island's most iconic image: Mount Otemanu. One of a pair of extinct volcanoes, this mighty monolith soars 2,400 feet above the aquamarine lagoon. For a truly epic adventure, arrange a guided hike or 4x4 trek to its lofty peak. The views cannot be adequately communicated with words.

The drama of Bora Bora's landscape is in sharp contrast to life on this island: casual, barefoot, unhurried, easygoing. Play on land or on water, or experience the underwater domain, where fish of every size and color play in the cathedral of the coral reef.

RANGIROA If you were a mermaid, you'd probably choose to live in Rangiroa's natural "aquarium." Not only is the scenery extraordinary, but the schools (of fish) are first-rate.

"The Island of the Immense Sky," as this secluded atoll is known, boasts a crystal lagoon so vast that the entire island of



Tahiti could fit within it, making Rangiroa a bucket-list destination for divers and snorkelers. The undersea discoveries here are exceptional with some of the most colorful and abundant marine life found anywhere on Earth. The submerged landscape borders on the hedonistic, home to fish of every shape, size, and color cavorting against a filigreed coral backdrop. You may even spy wild dolphins, playfully enjoying life as dolphins like to do.

French Polynesia's largest atoll invites you to find your perfect beach. If tranquil waters fringed by white velvet sand come to mind, you're covered. Or you might choose to wander the picturesque village of Avatoru, or venture just a stone's throw farther along to discover Dominique Auroy Winery which produces French Polynesia's only wine label, Vin de Tahiti.

The Gauguin offers two snorkeling excursions on Rangiroa. Drift snorkeling gently carries you with the current where the Pacific Ocean meets Rangiroa's lagoon. The view below the surface is said to be the island's best. Snorkeling Rangiroa's Aquarium brings you to another of the island's sweet spots, where you'll hand-feed the fish in their prismatic aquatic kingdom.

For slower-paced discovery, consider a Glass-Bottom Boat excursion that gently floats over the huge coral heads inside the Tiputa Channel. Here you'll be treated to colorful views of parrot, butterfly, and surgeon fish through the boat's large windows.

FAKARAVA This treasured enclave is home to flora and fauna not seen anywhere else on the globe. Designated

a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, you will see Mother Nature's handiwork firsthand on land and beneath the water. The Tuamotus' second-largest lagoon is one of the world's most prized (yet still relatively undiscovered) diving and snorkeling locations.

Like the rest of the South Pacific, the vibe on Fakarava is relaxed and stress-free. Unplug from your worries and spend your day wandering through the main village of Rotoava. What you're seeing is real, and this is just the beginning. Feel the warm sand between your toes on extraordinarily beautiful beaches. Or go beneath the glasslike surface of the lagoon for an entrée into another world.

Whether you spend your day exploring below the surface of the water or above, you've found paradise. As your cares melt away with the breeze, imprint this beautiful day in the bank of memories you reach for when one day someone asks you when you were happiest.

AT SEA Please report to the Pool Deck. The Gauguin's heated saltwater pool is calling. The sensation of being in the water while traveling on the water should not be missed. Take a dip. Grab a chaise. Order up a little food and your favorite cocktail. Chat up your fellow travelersone meets the most interesting people while at sea.

The day is a blank canvas before you. Tomorrow, Taha'a.

TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Forget your troubles, deadlines, and responsibilities on this gentle little islet that will steal your heart and tingle your

senses. Taha'a's sweet, vanilla-scented air will stay with you like your first kiss, while the island's beauty will be forever imprinted in your mind.

If you made it your quest on this voyage to find your perfect beach, you may discover it here at Motu Mahana, Paul Gauguin Cruises' own private slice of paradise. Bring your complimentary snorkel gear from the ship, feast on a barbecue lunch, and while away the afternoon doing whatever your vacationing heart desires.

MOOREA (OVERNIGHT) It seems like you could walk for miles in Moorea's waist-deep lagoon. The soft sand beneath your feet, the kiss of the sun on your shoulders. Like the finest uncut crystal, the warm water has such clarity it's almost as if it isn't there. With sparkling blue lagoons, crystalclear waters, and magnificent coral reefs, Tahiti and Her Islands, as French Polynesia is also known, is perfect for all manner of water play. The waters here average a steady 82°F/28°C yearround, making for a tempting invitation to jump in. And when traveling aboard the m/s Paul Gauguin—purpose built with a shallow draft to navigate these lagoons—you can enjoy complimentary water sports including kayaking and

paddleboarding directly from the ship's own marina. Or you might embark on any number of exciting optional excursions from outrigger canoeing and catamaran sailing to zipping around on wave runners or enjoying a leisurely glass-bottom boat ride.

The most amazing discoveries, however, tend to await below the water line. Here is a world brimming with vibrant coral gardens and pelagic life—think everything from Napoleon wrasse, butterfly fish, angelfish, octopus, and eels to sharks, rays, turtles, and more. It's perfect for snorkeling and SCUBA dive excursions for novice and experienced guests alike.

Some say that the best diving (and of course, snorkeling!) in French Polynesia is in the low-lying Tuamotu Archipelago. Fakarava is home to a UNESCO-listed Marine Biosphere Reserve rife with underwater canyons, coral heads, and a high concentration of whitetip sharks, turtles, and more. The reefs and passes here are legendary among divers for

their shark walls and large schools of fish from Napoleons and surgeon fish to butterflies and angels.

Also in the Tuamotus is Rangiroa, French Polynesia's largest atoll (second largest in the world!) which is also revered as the world's largest 'natural' aquarium.

Bora Bora's famous lagoon is surrounded by one of the world's most pristine reefs boasting cauliflower, elkhorn, and finger corals. The shallow sheltered waters are perfect for snorkeling and novice divers. Bora Bora is also famous for diving with manta rays and sharks (there are at least 16 shark species found here!). Meanwhile, Moorea's lagoon, a dissected shield volcano with a caldera surrounded by peaks, affords incredible underwater discoveries with opportunities to swim near dolphins and rays in the wild.

Covered in a thick jungle, Huahine is quiet and under the radar compared to some of her French Polynesian sister isles. The island offers excellent snorkeling among coral gardens in its lagoon. Finally, *The Gauquin's* own private islet, Motu Mahana, offers great drift snorkeling over an incredible coral garden brimming with butterfly fish, lion fish, brightly colored wrasse, clownfish, and great giant clams.



bridge and cradled by a coral reef. Not as
developed or populous as its neighbors,
Huahine is like a wish list for everything
you'd want in a romantic fantasy
destination: swaying palm trees, fragrant
flowers, aquamarine waters, and beaches
with sand as soft as talc.

If cultural pursuits are calling your name, Huahine doesn't disappoint. It's home to Maeva, one of Polynesia's best-preserved *marae*, or ancient Polynesian temples.

AT SEA Along with everything else you'll pack, be sure to remember to bring your appetite. Aboard *The Gauguin*, each

craving will be spectacularly sated. Every day Le Grill serves Afternoon Tea in high style—with finger sandwiches, fresh fruit, pastries, and petit fours. Breakfast or lunch *al fresco* beneath the vast azure sky is an exceedingly fine way to sample fare inspired by the islands you'll visit. And for a truly elegant meal, get spiffed up for a multi-course dinner at L'Etoile.

AITUTAKI It is believed that this island was settled around 900 A.D. by the legendary Polynesian explorer Ru. Today, its inhabitants keep their history alive through song, dance, legends, and crafts, in particular *tivaevae*—intricate, handmade patchwork quilts unique to the Cook Islands, featuring designs inspired by nature.

The island's coral reefs enclose a vast lagoon, which many believe rivals the usually beyond-compare Bora Bora lagoon. Several hundred species of fish make this their home, so underwater activities are a must. This island's quiet roads are ideally suited for exploration. For a panoramic experience, Aitutaki's highest point, Maunga Pu, is an easy hike with a huge payoff: 360-degree views of island and lagoon. For a real bucket-list experience, take the Lagoon Cruise with Beach Break and discover waters celebrated for their endless shades of turquoise. Shaped by volcanic peaks and coral reefs, the lagoon is dotted

with remote motus fringed with palms—perfect for snorkeling the coral gardens alive with tropical fish. You'll savor a barbecue lunch on One Foot Island—where the iconic passport stamp becomes a lasting keepsake of paradise.

RAROTONGA From the deck of *The Gauguin*, the primal beat of drums may be the first thing you hear. Next, your astounded eyes will take in the massive cathedral-like shell of an ancient volcano rising majestically against a sapphire sky. The largest of the 15 fabled Cook Islands, Rarotonga is embraced by a sparkling lagoon, sugar-white sands, and the friendly wave of palm trees. The unmistakable island sound of ukuleles floats in the air, and genuine smiles welcome you ashore.

Be warned: On Rarotonga, hurrying is strictly forbidden. The law of the island is to relax, immerse yourself in music, culture, and of course, unmatched beauty. This is the true island experience.

AT SEA It is highly probable that the extraordinary sights, sounds, and tastes that you experience on this voyage will awaken your creativity. Such beauty needs to be expressed. On deck, as the otherworldly South Pacific landscape floats by, you may be tempted to throw your arms open wide and burst into song.



If you're looking for a less vocal display of delight, you might consider sketching or painting—Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins are at the ready to share their passion for Polynesian arts and crafts. Make a basket out of coconut palm leaves, learn the ancient art of tapa (barkcloth), make your own jewelry with natural materials found on the islands, craft a bookmark out of indigenous pandanus leaves, and more. You'll return home with a one-of-a-kind memento of this extraordinary voyage.

BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT)

Famous. Exquisite. Adored. Breathtakingly beautiful. The supermodel of the South Pacific, you've seen countless photos and magazine covers of Bora Bora. Your pulse will race as you approach one of the most storied islands in the world—and you will find that photographs can't even begin to do her justice.

Your best course of action is to simply surrender to the considerable charms of this island. With so many things to do and see, you will easily fill your two days here. First, there's the water. Dazzling, warm, and inviting, Bora Bora's lagoon offers a cinematic below-the-surface experience for diving and snorkeling. Above: sailing, kayaking, jet boating, waverunner toursthe list goes on and on. And if you must dry off, there are guided hikes, 4x4 excursions, and ancient temples to explore.

The Bora Bora Off-Road Adventure excursion embraces this iconic island's natural beauty in an exciting exploration along roads less traveled. Highlights include visiting the small town of Vaitape, seeing cannons from WWII, and traveling along Bora Bora's north shore for a visit to the lush valley of Fa'anui. The journey concludes with spectacular views and photo opportunities of Fa'anui Bay.

Accessible only by boat, you'll see the mythical island of Bora Bora from the northwest coast; and a stone's throw across the lagoon, the tiny island of Raiatea gives a friendly wave.

Just offshore of Taha'a lies Motu Mahana. A motu is a tiny island, and Mahana is The Gauguin's own private slice of paradise, exclusive to her guests. Beneath swaying palm trees, the day is yours to create. Snorkel surrounded by Technicolor fish. Grab a kayak for a bit of exploring. CULTURE CORNER:

UNESCO World Heritage Wonders

From sacred stone temples to pristine marine sanctuaries, French Polynesia's UNESCO World Heritage sites reveal a legacy that is both timeless and alive.

Across the globe, UNESCO World Heritage sites are chosen for their universal value—places where nature, culture, and human history intersect in extraordinary ways. To stand among them is to be recognized as part of humanity's collective story. For French Polynesia, the three sites that are scattered like jewels across the fabled waters here affirm the islands' unique role as both guardians of the ocean and keepers of an ancient seafaring culture.



Fakarava: A Living Sea

Inscribed 1977

In the Tuamotu Archipelago, the atoll of Fakarava shimmers with life. Designated a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, it is a sanctuary where reef sharks glide through coral gardens and parrotfish flash neon colors in crystalline waters. Here, nature writes in light and movement, and every dive or snorkel uncovers a new revelation. But Fakarava is more than a diver's dream. It is a testament to harmony between people and sea. Villagers farm pearls and cultivate coconuts while safeguarding a marine ecosystem so pure it has become a global touchstone for conservation.



Taputapuatea: The Sacred Heart of Polynesia

Inscribed 2017

On Raiatea lies Taputapuatea, the great marae (sacred ground) complex recognized as the most significant cultural site in Polynesia. For a thousand years, it was the beating heart of the Polynesian Triangle, a ceremonial and political center where chiefs, warriors, and navigators gathered. Beneath open skies, priests called upon the gods and voyagers sought blessings before departing on star-guided journeys that would shape the Pacific world. Walking the stone courtyards today, visitors can still feel the *mana*—the spiritual power—that once bound distant islands in shared ancestry and belief.



The Marquesas: **A Wild Frontier**

Inscribed 2024

Most recently, the remote Marquesas Islands were inscribed on UNESCO's list in 2024, sealing their place as one of Earth's last great wildernesses. Rising like fortress walls from the ocean, these islands conceal ancient stone tikis in forested valleys and echo with chants of a civilization that flourished a millennium ago. Their cliffs host colonies of seabirds undisturbed for centuries, while their surrounding waters welcome dolphins and migrating whales. Few places remain so untouched, so defiantly authentic. To step ashore in the Marquesas is to alimpse the Pacific as it once was—and still endures.



Fakarava, Taputapuatea, and the Marquesas stand as shining examples of what makes French Polynesia extraordinary. They are not just points on a map. They are a living heritage reminders of the beauty and spirit these islands share with the world.

It's not enough to call this a vacation, for it's so much more than that. Part bucket-list adventure, part transformational experience, these 14 unforgettable nights aboard the m/s Paul Gauguin explore some of the most majestic islands in all of the storied South Pacific.

This journey is an exercise in juxtaposition: The relaxed luxury of shipboard life contrasts beautifully with the wilds of the Marquesas Islands. The picture-perfect Society Islands beg for photos to be taken and postcards to be sent back home, while the Tuamotu Archipelago gives you the perfect reason to unplug and immerse yourself in all Mother Nature has to offer.

Two weeks is the perfect amount of time to decide: which island will be your favorite?



TAHITI There's a buzzy energy to Tahiti's capital city of Papeete that is unmistakably Polynesian. Vibrant, friendly, and unpretentious, the city is the flip side of the island's majestic peaks, lush jungles, tumbling waterfalls, and stellar blue lagoon. Before you sail, you might want to take in some of the history, culture, island lore, and art found in the many museums and galleries throughout the city.

AT SEA There's something very special about the first day at sea on board The Gauguin. This is Page 1, with many unwritten chapters ahead. Will your story be a romance? A fantasy? An adventure? Perhaps all of these... and more.

Do a little exploring and get to know this beautiful vessel, your home upon the sea for the next two weeks. Take some time to relax and let the South Pacific trade winds carry your cares and concerns away.

FAKARAVA It's called the "Island of Dreams," and you'll be dreaming of Fakarava long after your visit. The second largest of the Tuamotu atolls (second only to Rangiroa), Fakarava's rectangular reef is home to a rich ecosystem, one of seven in a designated UNESCO Biosphere Reserve. Above and below the water, it's as if Mother Nature put on her best dress for you to admire and exclaim, "My, aren't you fetching!"

Fakarava lures divers from all over the world, inviting them to take a peek below the surface in search of barracudas, manta and eagle rays, hammerhead sharks, dolphins, and turtlesall playing amidst the dramatic coral landscape. On land, let the sea breeze guide you to the southern end of the lagoon, where you'll find a church made entirely of coral, built by missionaries in 1874.

AT SEA There is something innately glamorous about lounging on the deck of a ship as the horizon drifts past. Whether in a deck-side chaise with a tropical libation in hand and a novel at the ready, or relaxing poolside simply soaking up the sun, The Gauguin is designed for your idle and indulgent pleasure. Consider a visit to the fitness center, capped with a rejuvenating interlude at the spa.

Your onboard hosts, Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins, are happy to lead Tahitian dance lessons, hands-on crafting projects, and an array of activities for all ages and interests.

As the Golden Hour approaches, prepare for a spectacular Polynesian sunset enjoyed on deck. The colors really do defy description.

FATU HIVA The Marquesas: Wild. Dramatic. Bold. Here, the Pacific Ocean pounds against jagged cliffs—sharply sculpted mountains reaching so high that a fine mist of clouds often comes down to meet them. In contrast to the aquamarine waters and lagoons of the Society Islands, the water here is a deep indigo; no coral reef barriers, but a world of wonder still.

The southernmost island in the Marquesas, Fatu Hiva may also be the most beautiful. This isolated paradise really is "off the radar." No airstrip, only one road, and just 500 residents. Explorer and archaeologist Thor Heyerdahl immortalized Fatu Hiva in a book of the same name published in 1974, detailing his one-and-a half-year quest to escape civilization in the 1930s. Little has changed since then.

HIVA OA With its deep valleys, rugged peaks, and dense velvet rain forests, Hiva Oa's jungles hold many secrets, including ancient, massive stone tiki carvings and petroglyphs whose true meanings have never been definitively explained. If you enjoy exploring, this is the place. Experienced guides are eager to lead you to some truly mysterious hidden treasures.

The city of Atuona is a favorite of the yacht set, with just enough of an islandy-cosmopolitan vibe to make things interesting. It's easy to understand how artist Paul Gauguin and Belgianborn songwriter Jacques Brel came to call this island home. (They're still here; you can visit both at the Calvaire Cemetery.)

The island's rich history plays out on an unforgettable guided off-road Atuona to Taaoa expedition leading you to beautifully preserved dwellings, ceremonial sites, and sacred archaeological ruins. You'll see enormous tiki, sacrificial altar stones, and thousand-year-old relics, among the most significant in the Marquesas.

TAHUATA The smallest of the Marquesas' inhabited islands with only 600 residents, you'll immediately feel welcome by the locals here,



and quite possibly by the pod of dolphins who regularly ply the waters.

Arrival is at the quaint village of Hapatoni, where an open-air market presents a wealth of locally made handicrafts (and no self-respecting South Seas traveler returns home without a woodcarving!).

A guided all-terrain **Hapatoni Discovery** tour explores the island's wilderness, villages, and history, including scenic lookouts and brilliant vistas of regal mountain peaks

NUKU HIVA The largest of the Marquesas Islands, Nuku Hiva's beauty is untamed. Rugged cliffs nose-dive into the ocean. A carpet of green jungle creeps from the water's edge, reaching upward. Shadows dance on the shoreline and knife-like peaks disappear behind a scrim of clouds. Optional tours will lead you to massive banyan trees, hidden valleys, and stunning bay views... and for the truly lucky, you may even sneak a peek of the island's wild horses.

An immersive off-road **Visit of Taipivai Valley** excursion leads to one of the richest archaeological sites in the Marquesas Islands. Dotted with tikis and sacred statuary, the valley is made famous by the writings of American novelist Herman Melville who deserted his ship and lived for weeks among the indigenous natives; Melville's *Typee:* A *Peep at Polynesian Life* was published in 1846, six years before he wrote *Moby-Dick*.

AT SEA This voyage is all about exploration, and there are opportunities for discovery tailored to every interest and inclination. Le Grand Salon plays host to myriad talks, presentations, and screenings—don't miss watching *The Bounty* on the big screen to see Hollywood's version of the infamous mutiny. You can choose to enhance your kitchen prowess with cooking

demonstrations by the ship's executive chef or enjoy games of chess, trivia, and bridge.

With two leisurely days at sea, you'll have plenty of time to relax, soak up the sun, and marvel at the ocean's beauty.

HUAHINE Huahine is the best-kept secret in the Society Islands. Often referred to as the Garden of Eden, it's hard to envision a more idyllic setting, seemingly untouched by the outside world.

The people of Huahine are known for their incredible warmth and welcome. Eight tiny villages spread over two islands encourage wandering. In Fare, you'll find local handicrafts and intimate eateries showcasing the true flavors of French Polynesia. You can also arrange underwater activities and guided tours of the island's many ancient temples and iconic sites.

BORA BORA Like a priceless painting come to life, this island is one of the world's top honeymoon destinations, and for good reason. The landscape alone will have you searching for adequate adjectives: soaring volcanic peaks, impossibly green jungles, flowers in an explosion of vibrant colors. And then there's the lagoon. Can you capture that exact shade of turquoise in words? You may find it cannot be done, but you'll keep trying.

TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Resembling a flower-shaped emerald in a glittering silver setting, the "Vanilla Island" will greet you as you awaken on board. Once you've realized you're not in the middle of a very beautiful dream, enjoy breakfast and disembark for a remarkable day of exploration.

Tahitian vanilla is as coveted as Tahitian pearls. the **Exploration of Taha'a** excursion allows you to explore both a small family-owned vanilla plantation and a black pearl farm, where you will see how pearls are grown and harvested. You'll also do some off-road exploring, traversing the island's highest mountain and meandering coastline.

Throughout the day, the ship's tender service whisks guests to and from **Motu Mahana**, *The Gauguin*'s own private island, accessible only to her guests. Swim, snorkel to your heart's content, or relax beneath gently swaying palm trees. Be sure you stay hydrated with refreshments from the floating bar, and complete your visit with a grand beachside barbecue showcasing the bounty of French Polynesia.

MOOREA Anyone who has ever seen Rogers & Hammerstein's South Pacific will probably have the song Bali Hai in their head while ashore on Moorea. Said to be the inspiration for the James A. Michener novel on which the musical is based, Moorea is a favorite destination for many. As undeniably beautiful as each island is, Moorea has a little extra je ne sais quoi. "The Magical Island" beckons, hypnotizes, entrances. You will have the day to explore at your leisure, with adventures both on land and sea. What suits you? Quaint villages, pineapple plantations, golf, hiking trails for all levels of physical fitness and energy? Or is it snorkeling, diving, sailing, and lagoon excursions aplenty.

PAPEETE, TAHITI Following a memorable day on Moorea, it's time to wend your way back to your point of origin in Papeete. For one last magical evening on deck, raise a glass with the friends you've made here.

Armed with matchless memories, it's time to return to the "real world." When you feel the caress of a warm breeze or the kiss of the sun on your shoulders, think of the islands, and of your friends on board. *The Gauguin* will patiently await your return.














TOP: Sea turtles glide gracefully through Moorea's crystalline lagoons. BOTTOM: Sharing tales of the day's adventures at La Veranda.





Fiji, Tonga, Cook & Society Islands

(This itinerary also operates in reverse.)

Follow in the wake of the most celebrated South Pacific explorers and experience the same magic that has enthralled wanderers for thousands of years. Prepare to discover the region's most storied, beautiful, and culturally vibrant islands over the course of 14 unhurried nights (remember, this itinerary crosses the International Dateline—a bucket-list experience for many—meaning that you'll either gain or lose a day depending on the direction of your itinerary).

Your own voyage of discovery includes the Society Islands, in the very waters that the m/s Paul Gauguin calls home, as well as the stunning Cook Islands, an unspoiled paradise recognized by Lonely Planet as a Top Country in its 2022 Best in Travel. Visits to the Kingdom of Tonga, aka "The Friendly Isles," and the islands of Fiji, whose website currently reads "Open for Happiness," take you deep into South Pacific destinations revered for both their beauty and welcoming spirit.

TAHITI Considered one of the world's most exotic locations, Tahiti boasts a beauty that is nothing short of exquisite. The m/s Paul Gauguin docks in the harbor of Tahiti's capital city Papeete, where markets, museums, and galleries await your exploration.

MOOREA One of the stars of the Society Island archipelago, heart-shaped Moorea is often described as the most beautiful place on Earth with a beauty uniquely her own. Eight soaring peaks crown this island of volcanic origin, cloaking her in a verdant blanket of lush rainforest. She embraces two gorgeous bays—Opunohu Bay on the west and Cook's Bay on the east. Yet it is her captivating lagoon in every shade of blue that rivals that of her dazzling, better-known sister Bora Bora.

So while Moorea certainly does have a certain *je nes se quois* that's a little difficult to explain, the best advice is to surrender completely to whatever this magical island has in store for you.

Dolphins are known as some of the happiest of the animal kingdom—and they're pretty smart too. So it stands to reason that they appreciate the beauty of Moorea as much as we do. Join the **Dolphin Watching Expedition**, a

combination eco-tour and research expedition led by world-renowned dolphin and whale expert, marine biologist Dr. Michael Poole, where you'll likely see schools of acrobatic spinner dolphins playing against Moorea's dramatic beauty. Following your tour and time permitting, you may have an opportunity to go swimming or snorkeling before returning to the ship.

TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Enclosed in a lagoon shared with Raiatea and accessible only by boat, Taha'a is an ideal destination for a truly relaxing escape. It's also home to **Motu Mahana**, Paul Gauguin Cruises' private islet, accessible only to guests. You will be welcomed ashore with traditional Polynesian music performed by Les Gauguines. You're then invited to take advantage of the floating bar, a bountiful beachside barbecue, and ample opportunities for watersports and relaxation.

BORA BORA There she is, the crown jewel of the South Pacific. Rising majestically from her famed lagoon, itself a lavish display of never-ending turquoise, sapphire, and indigo waters. It's true: Bora Bora is renowned the world over for her inviting—and intoxicating—romantic beauty. The setting has inspired passion for thousands of years. Resistance is futile.

Have your camera ready. Bora Bora just begs to have her picture taken, with lush peaks, white-sand beaches, and romantic lagoons. You can't miss the island's most iconic image: Mount Otemanu. Once a pair of extinct volcanoes, this mighty monolith soars 2,400 feet above the aquamarine lagoon. For a truly epic adventure, arrange a guided hike or 4x4 trek to the lofty peak, or opt for a simple and leisurely day at Paul Gauguin Cruises' private beach.

AT SEA With a day left to your own devices on board *The Gauguin*, there is no time like the present to make this all about you. Start the day with breakfast in your stateroom and spend the morning reviewing the multitude of photos you've taken so far. Then, how about a nice workout at the fitness center followed by a visit to the spa for some serious rejuvenation? A fresh lunch *al fresco* at La Veranda, followed by a nap, and before you know it, it's time to slip into your evening finery for a sumptuous dinner at L'Etoile.

AITUTAKI An aerial view of the second most-visited island in the Cooks looks a lot like a precious piece of turquoise agate floating atop a sapphire sea. The approach by ship is equally as mesmerizing as the multi-hued colors of the lagoon come into view. Rich in both natural beauty and



history, it is believed that Aitutaki was settled around 900 A.D. by the legendary Polynesian explorer Ru. Today, its inhabitants keep their history alive through song, dance, legends, and crafts.

The island's coral reefs enclose a vast lagoon—which many believe rivals the usually beyond-compare Bora Bora (and Moorea, *le sigh...* such is life in the South Pacific!). Several hundred species of fish make these waters their home, so underwater activities are a must.

A great way to "dive in" and explore the lagoon is on a guided **Snorkeling Tour** to Motu Maina. Here the pretty reefs reward with colorful damsels, butterflyfish, Picasso triggers, and lots of giant clams.

AT SEA (2 DAYS) Days at sea are a welcome oasis of relaxation and rejuvenation. Your voyage is hosted by *The Gauguin's* own troupe of Gauguines, local Tahitians who bring the spirit of Polynesia to life. Enjoy a retelling of ancestral legends through dance; delight in traditional songs; learn local handicrafts during hands-on demonstrations; and fall in love with the warmth of a beautiful culture.

VAVA'U Tiny-but-mighty Tonga is Polynesia's only remaining monarchy and takes great pride in being the only island nation in the Pacific not to have been colonized by a foreign power. The kingdom is comprised of some 170 islands divided into three main groups; of these, the northern group of Vava'u is considered the loveliest. A favorite haven for yachts, a call here invites discovery of Vava'u's culture and food, hiking Mount Talau, and snorkeling in its crystalline lagoon.

These Islands are a wonderland of wildlife. Beneath the gentle waves, spinner dolphins, giant clams, manta rays, sea turtles, and more than 100 species of tropical fish cavort through coral landscapes.

For a truly special experience, the **Swallow Cave and Island Getaway** takes you by boat to Kapa Island to explore a remarkable cave that is not, as its name might suggest, inhabited by swallows. Rather, hundreds of swiftlets flit about in the dim light and nest in the darkness of the cave's upper reaches. The experience concludes with a visit to Falevai Mui Houma Beach.

AT SEA During your leisurely day at sea, learn more about the culture of the islands you're visiting with onboard lectures, presentations, and demonstrations. The traditional Polynesian dress for women, the pareo (or sarong), originated in Tahiti and the Cook Islands. Often brilliantly emblazoned with hibiscus flowers, indigenous designs, or traditional tapa patterns, today, pareos are sported by both men and women, and there are many ways to tie and wear them. Learn how from Les Gauguines.

SAVUSAVU Like a smile that can't be suppressed, the island of Vanua Levu in northern Fiji presents itself with blushing splendor, and Savusavu is your welcome entry. Charming, unassuming, and unspoiled, the second largest of Fiji's 300 islands extends a warm hello with lush green hills surrounded by coral reefs. Some call it the "Hidden Paradise of Fiji," and you will likely agree.

Described by Jean-Michel Cousteau as the "Soft Coral Capital of the World," Fiji offers some of the world's finest snorkeling and dive sites among the reefs, caves, and grottos with diverse marine life including sharks, turtles, tuna, and fish of all shapes, colors, and sizes. For discovery of the island itself, the **Nakawaqa Waterfall & Rainforest** excursion leads you to a hidden spot of remarkable beauty.

SUVA Suva is perched on a hilly peninsula between two harbors on the island of Viti Levu. Every view is a stunning combination of blues and greens, volcanic cliffs, and velvet jungles. Fiji's capital city is a fascinating mix of modern and colonial architecture, rich in Fijian culture with museums, galleries, and marketplaces to explore. Fiji's highest peak, Mount Tomanivi, is an exquisite landmark from every vantage point. The shell of this ancient volcano is an unforgettable climb for experienced hikers.

BEQA ISLAND It seems that everyone you meet in Fiji is wearing a smile. And when you behold the tiny island of Beqa (pronounced "BENG-uh"), it's easy to understand why. The startlingly turquoise lagoon is cradled in the crater of an extinct volcano. Waterfalls tumble, golden sands sparkle, and gentle breezes whisper the secrets of this paradise rich in tradition and heritage, where the ancient ritual of Fijian firewalking began.

Beqa may be small—less than six square miles in all—but the hospitality here is as big as the South Pacific. There are no paved roads and only a sprinkling of friendly villages. From the lush forests, trees heavy with coconut and papaya wave a friendly hello. Pristine beaches frame one of the world's largest barrier reefs, a paradise for divers, snorkelers, and fishing enthusiasts.

LAUTOKA Located on Viti Levu, Lautoka is known as "Sugar City" for the golden-green sugarcane that surrounds it on three sides. The palm-lined main street invites strolling and shopping, while the lagoon is perfect for swimming, snorkeling, and diving. And the beaches? Flawless, with super-fine white sand and swaying coconut palms.

One of the island's highlights is the Garden of the Sleeping Giant, which includes manicured lawns, lily ponds, fountains, and more than 2,000 truly rare Asian and Cattleya orchid hybrids, once the private collection of actor Raymond Burr. A fitting end to your idyllic voyage!
