



The **pool** is the perfect spot for leisurely dips, reading and taking in the beautiful scenery.





Whispers from the Pacific

The legends of the Pacific communities weave an unbreakable link between the people and their environment, their stories being passed down from generation to generation by word of mouth. Each community draws its roots, its history, its raison d'être from this. Take a closer look at five founding tales common in French Polynesia.

Maui at the birth of the islands

In Polynesian mythology, the demigod Maui, armed with his hook, is said to have fished out islands from the bottom of the ocean and brought them to the surface. Explaining the topography of Polynesia, a string of volcanic islands scattered across the vastness of the Pacific, this myth reflects the deep connection of its communities to the ocean and echoes their Hawaiki.

Hawaiki birthplace of sailors

Polynesians describe Hawaiki as a fascinating place, familiar but elusive, the beginning and end of everything, a universal but intangible force (reminiscent of mana). It is the life giver of their civilisation and where beings return to rest in peace. It is said that their ancestors left Hawaiki, their original paradise, to populate the archipelagos of the South Pacific. A pirogue race, Hawaiki Nui Va'a, is held every year in the Leeward Islands to celebrate this great sailing epic.

The quest

for Moorea's yellow lizard

When parents are frightened by their child's appearance as a giant lizard with yellow scales, they abandon him on an island, but he sets out to find them. Exhausted by his quest and his grief, he drowns. His body drifted to the island of Aimenho and the locals who discovered him began chanting "Mo'orea" ("yellow lizard" in Tahitian). Some say that his body was swallowed up by the earth and that his grief can still be seen in the steep relief of the island and hence the change of the island's name.

The coconut palm

source of life

Legend has it that when Princess Hina was promised to a monstrous eel prince she fled and sought the help of the demigod Maui, who killed the beast and handed over its head. He warned her not to drop it on the ground. While distracted, Hina forgot the advice and the earth opened up to swallow this precious possession. A strange tree emerged, like an upright eel, its head pointing towards the sun, giving birth to Polynesia's first coconut tree.

Tattooing a spiritual anchor

Far from being a simple ornament, tattoos represent a history, an identity engraved on the skin and a symbol of resilience. Once it was reserved for warriors and marked the passage to adulthood. Now it has become part of family heritage and a spiritual link with ancestors, animals or demigods. Each archipelago has developed its own art of the *tatau*, its own symbols and meanings, varying according to the part of the body being tattooed.











On this itinerary, you will be able to enjoy a full day on Raiatea (which replaces one of the two days on Moorea on the **Tahiti & the Society Islands** itinerary). According to legend, the island is the cradle of the gods because it is home to the earliest traces of local human habitation as well as the oldest place of worship in Polynesia – namely the Taputapuātea marae, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This platform was once a highly important political, ceremonial and funerary centre.

The island also has a wonderful range of nature and wildlife to reveal to curious guests who come to explore.






Warm and personal, a trip to the Cook Islands means an exploration of stunning landscapes and the philosophy of a sweet life. The largest of them, Rarotonga, is surrounded by a coral reef on which the waves of the South Pacific break. The profile of the jagged mountains stands out against the intense blue of the sky on this perfectly circular island. Snorkelling enthusiasts should take note that there is a world of underwater treasures to explore at Aitutaki, a haven of peace and simplicity.



8th May departure: the stopover in Ua Pou is replaced by a stopover in Tahuata, in the Marquesas Islands.

Jacques Brel wrote songs about their wild beauty and they inspired much of Paul Gauguin's art – the landmarks and landscapes change dramatically in the Marquesas, known as the 'Land of Men'. Cliffs rise steeply from the depths of the ocean and abundant vegetation softens the jagged reliefs. Like their islands, the soul of the Marquesans is filled with an ancestral spirit. The islanders, famous throughout Polynesia for their intricate craftsmanship, sculpt objects from wood, stone and bone, and are renowned for their prowess in the art of tattooing.

Formalities

For all cruises

The information below is current but subject to change at any time without advance notice from government authorities. Please consult your respective government agencies for visa and health information.

Passport valid for at least 6 months beyond the completion of your trip. Passport must contain at least two completely clear, blank, unused visa pages for each visa required, not including any amendment pages. Visa pages with stains or ink from other pages in the passport are not usable. Guests who deviate from the scheduled embarkation or disembarkation port should research the

foreign entry requirements for the port country. Due to government regulations, regrettably, PONANT will have to deny boarding to any guest who fails to obtain the appropriate travel documentation for this trip.

A copy of the visas and travel authorisations that you will apply for from the relevant authorities, or vaccination certificates for destinations where they are compulsory, must be sent to PONANT no later than **45 days before departure.** We also ask you to print out these documents and keep them in your passport throughout your trip.

(1) United States: should your flight transit via the USA, depending on your nationality, a visa or ESTA may be required. Please contact USA consulate website for details. Please note that if you have travelled or lived in countries such as Cuba (on or after 12 January 2021), Iran, Iraq, Sudan, Yemen, Somalia, Libya, Syria or North Korea, the US Department of Homeland Security can deny your ESTA. In this event, you must apply to an ambassy for a category B1/B2 visa to travel to the United States. The visa processing time is several months. If you already have an ESTA (valid for 2 years), we ask you to check its status up until the day of departure on the dedicated website.

(2) Indonesia: on this particular cruise, the entry and/or exit port in Indonesia do not allow for visa-exemption. Your visa will be delivered and charged onboard (45 US\$, subject to change) and valid for 30 days.

(3) Papua New Guinea: visa delivered onboard free of charge.

(4) Fiji: you will receive, together with your cruise documents, an 'Arrival in Fiji' letter, which you will need to present upon arrival in Nadi airport.

(5) Solomon Islands: visa delivered onboard free of charge.

(6) Vanuatu: no visa required.

(7) Australia: an Electronic Travel Authority (ETA) must be obtained before your arrival in Australia. For more information, please visit https://immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/visas/getting-avisa/visa-finder. Carriers should be aware that there will not be any physical evidence in your passport. Australian customs regulations are very strict, especially for the import of food items such as fresh food (even sealed), fruits, eggs, meat, plants, vegetables, seeds, grains. It is recommended that you contact your health professional for any specific medical advice, including on Malaria prevention and dengue fever.
